Medical Self-Help Program Available To Local Citizens

County Civilian Defense chairman, C. J. D. Bauman, has notified me that he has available a "Medical Self-Help" program of 12 lessons, in film strip form, that are to be used in the county to acquaint the citizenry with emergency action in case of flood, atomic attack, or any other catastrophe.

Mrs. Velma Glass, county health nurse, has offered to conduct these classes in your community if there is sufficient interest.

The self-containing kit includes a projector and small screen, 12 filmstrips, and student handbook to take home for further study.

Topics included are: "Radioactive Fallout and Shelter"—The important thing to note in this lesson is the rapid rate of decay of radioactive material during the first hours. Radiation sickness is described and jointers on protection given.

"Hygiene, Sanitation and Vermin Control"—Finger, feces and flies—remember these three words! They represent the three most important ways in which disease is transmitted. Suggestions are given on how you can protect yourself.

"Water and Flood"—Some facts on water are given in this lesson; (1) Don't drink water from unprotected source, (2) purify when in doubt, (3) Know your Home Water system. Suggested foods (that can be protected) are given.

"Shock"—What areas of the body are affected if a person is in shock? How do you treat them? This is all covered.

"Bleeding"—Arm and leg wounds, stomach wound, chest bleeding, neck and face wounds. Treatment is told.

"Artificial Respiration"—"Mouth-to-mouth" breathing is taught.

"Fractures and Splinting"—We learn there are two types of fractures, and treatment of each.

"Transportation of the Injured"—Shirts, jackets, and short coats can be utilized as an improvised stretcher. Correct lifting of the injured is covered.

"Burns"—Thermal, electrical, chemical, and first, second, and third degree burns are discussed.

"Nursing Care of the Sick and Injured"—Immunizations "now" is urged. Things that you can do at home for the sick and injured are stressed.

"Infant and Child Care"—New born babies need to be kept warm, clean, and fed. This lesson gives ways this might be accomplished in an emergency.

"Emergency Childbirth"—How do you cope with it?

The course would take 12 one-hour meetings; or six two-hour meetings to cover. "They can be either afternoon or evening classes," says the county health nurse.
