IRRIGON—Mayor Chester Wilson presided at the regular City Council meeting held Tuesday evening. Following the reading of the minutes by City Recorder Marguerite Houghton, Mayor Wilson reported that he had met with Attorney Belt concerning the opening of 6th Street. The necessary papers to have the street opened have been completed, and the next step will be a public hearing, as a crossing will have to be built over the railroad tracks.

Warren McCoy was appointed Street Commissioner, and plans were discussed to seal-coat the existing oiled roads, before they deteriorate. Names were suggested for the budget committee, but had not been confirmed.

Mrs. Houghton read a letter from the League of Oregon Cities in regard to the possibility of small towns receiving Federal Aid for the purpose of installing a city water system. A "fact-finding" committee regarding the matter of city water will be appointed.
