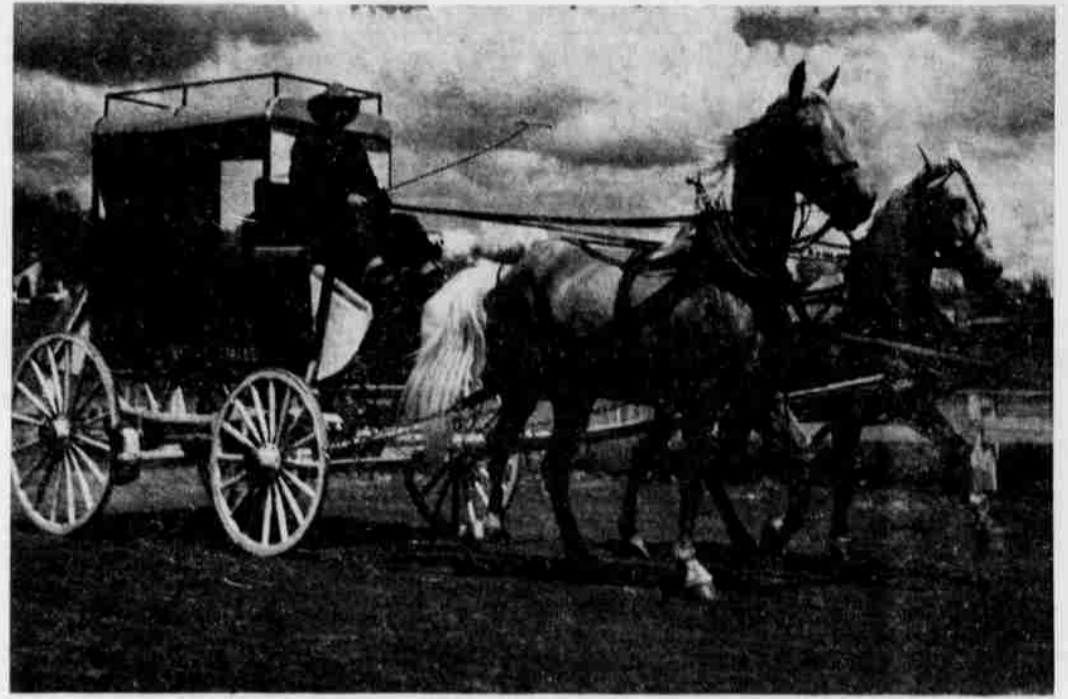

Ione Vacation School To Start on Monday

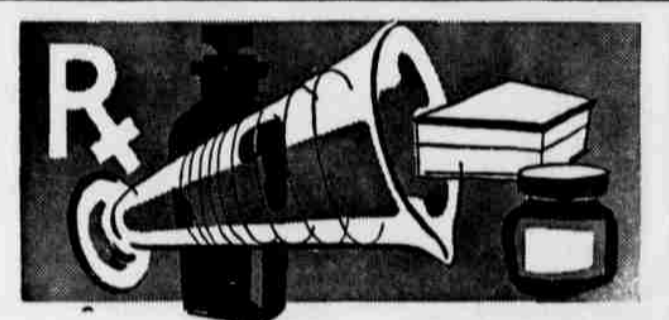
