Poland to Lead Jehovah Group To Convention

Hermiston's Ted Poland, Box 527, is a minister on the move. The Poland family will lead a delegation of members of the Hermiston congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses to an international convention of the religious group scheduled for the Pasadena Rose Bowl, September 1-8.

Convention officials in Pasadena, Calif., announced that 70,000 persons are expected to attend the eight-day gathering representing the Western United States, Canada and Mexico.

"We plan our annual vacation around an outing for the family including travel," Mr. Poland said, "but also on the agenda is attendance at a religious convention of Jehovah's Witnesses which is a regular part of our ministerial training program. This year our plans revolve around a trip to Pasadena."

"A total of 21 other assemblies are planned around the world," Mr. Poland said, "covering Europe, the Near East, Asia, Australia and the Isles of the Pacific. These meetings are Bible educational sessions designed to point out the responsibilities and obligations resting upon Christians in these critical times."
