

Services Held Monday For Nels H. Kristensen

BOARDMAN—Funeral services were held Monday at 2 p.m. in Hermiston for Nels H. Kristensen, 72, who died at Good Shepherd hospital August 1, having suffered a heart attack following surgery. Rev. Arthur Lewis, pastor of Good Shepherd Lutheran church, conducted the services. Mrs. LaVern Partlow sang "The Old Rugged Cross" and "Whispering Hope."

Mr. Kristensen was born June 13, 1891 in Hammel, Denmark, coming to the United States in 1910. He was married to Sine Miller in 1921 in Seattle, Wn. They came to Boardman at that time, and have lived here since, farming in the east end for 42 years.

He served as director on the board of the Umatilla Electric Cooperative Association for ten years, and also was on the board of the West Extension Irrigation District for many years. He was a World War I Veteran.

Survivors are the widow at Boardman; one daughter, Mrs. Bill (Elizabeth) Thompson of Spokane, Wn.; a sister, Mrs. Martin Larsen of Infall, Alberta, Canada; four sisters and one brother in Denmark, and three grandchildren. A son preceded him in death.
