State to Hold Sale Of Used Vehicles

The State of Oregon will hold its fourth annual vehicle sale of used cars and trucks at Pendleton, Saturday, September 14. The sale will commence at 10 a.m., PDT, on the parking lot of the State Office Building, 700 S. E. Emigrant at 7th, and will consist of two station wagons, 23 passenger cars, one Jeep, four pickups, four trucks, including dumps and stake beds, and one Model 94-30 caliber rifle. The vehicles will range from 1931 to 1962 models and will include several four wheel drive units.

Service Academy Examinations Set

The competitive United States Civil Service Designation Examination used in connection with securing a nomination to the United States Air Force, Merchant Marine, Military, and Naval Academies will be held November 9, 1963 at 30 Oregon cities, it was announced by Senator Maurine B. Neuberger.

The purpose of the examination is to provide an objective testing method to aid Senators and Representatives in the selection of nominees to the four academies.

Qualified young men who are seeking a nomination should write Senator Neuberger or other members of the Oregon Congressional delegation for authorization to take this test.

Senator Neuberger explained that her nominations to the academies are based on merit from scores obtained in the Civil Service Designation Examination and passage of the preliminary physical. Young men are now being processed who desire to enter the academies in the summer of 1964.

Examinations are scheduled to be in 30 Oregon cities, among them being Pendleton, Hermiston, John Day, La Grande, Burns, and The Dalles.

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
