## Boardman Schools Enroll 126 Pupils

BOARDMAN — Riverside High school and Boardman grade school opened September 3 with an enrollment of 126, states Ronald Daniels, principal. There were 71 in the high school, with two more expected to enter Wednesday. There were 15 freshmen, 19 sophomores, 22 juniors and 15 seniors. The two yet to enter were one each in the junior and senior class.

The grade school had a total enrollment of 55, which is grades 1-4. This is the same as last year, except it included grades 5 and 6. They go to Irrigon this year, 16 pupils. If Boardman had kept these two grades, the enrollment would have been 71, the same as the high school. There are 19 in the first grade, 12 in the second, 15 in the third, and nine in the fourth.

There will be Sunday school services at the Good Shepherd Lutheran church each Sunday at 10 a.m., starting September 8. Church services will be held at 7 p.m., with Rev. Arthur Lewis, of Pendleton as minister.

The Boardman Garden club flower show which was scheduled for September 7 has been cancelled until spring.

The Rev. Delmar Westerfield, 33, Assembly of God minister at Condon, was in the Pioneer Memorial hospital for two days after being involved in a logging truck accident about 45 miles south of Heppner August 31.

It was reported that the truck he was driving went out of control when brakes failed. The Rev. Westerfield suffered severe scalp lacerations. After treatment in the hospital, his condition improved rapidly and he was released September 2.
