Justice Court News

David Proudfoot, 17, Butter creek, pleaded guilty to a charge of reckless driving on his appearance November 29. He was fined \$160 by Oliver Creswick, justice of the peace, and his driver's license was suspended for one year. Proudfoot was driver of a car that collided recently with a pickup of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Rood who had been stopped at a roadblock on Willow Creek by State Officer Jim Gordon to check hunters. Officer Gordon sustained a broken leg

in the accident. Creswick said that Proudfoot has had three driving citations this year.

David Kenneth Hinkley, 22, was bound over to the Morrow county grand jury by Justice Creswick November 29 after the defendant pleaded innocent to an information charging him with burglary not in a dwelling. He is held in the Umatilla county jail in lieu of posting \$2500 bail. Hinkley is accused of taking band instruments from Riverside High school and a surveyor's transit from the state highway shop at Boardman. An information also charges Leonard Charles Wilson, 21, with burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the same incidents but the warrant has not yet been served. Wilson is currently in a hospital in Hermiston.

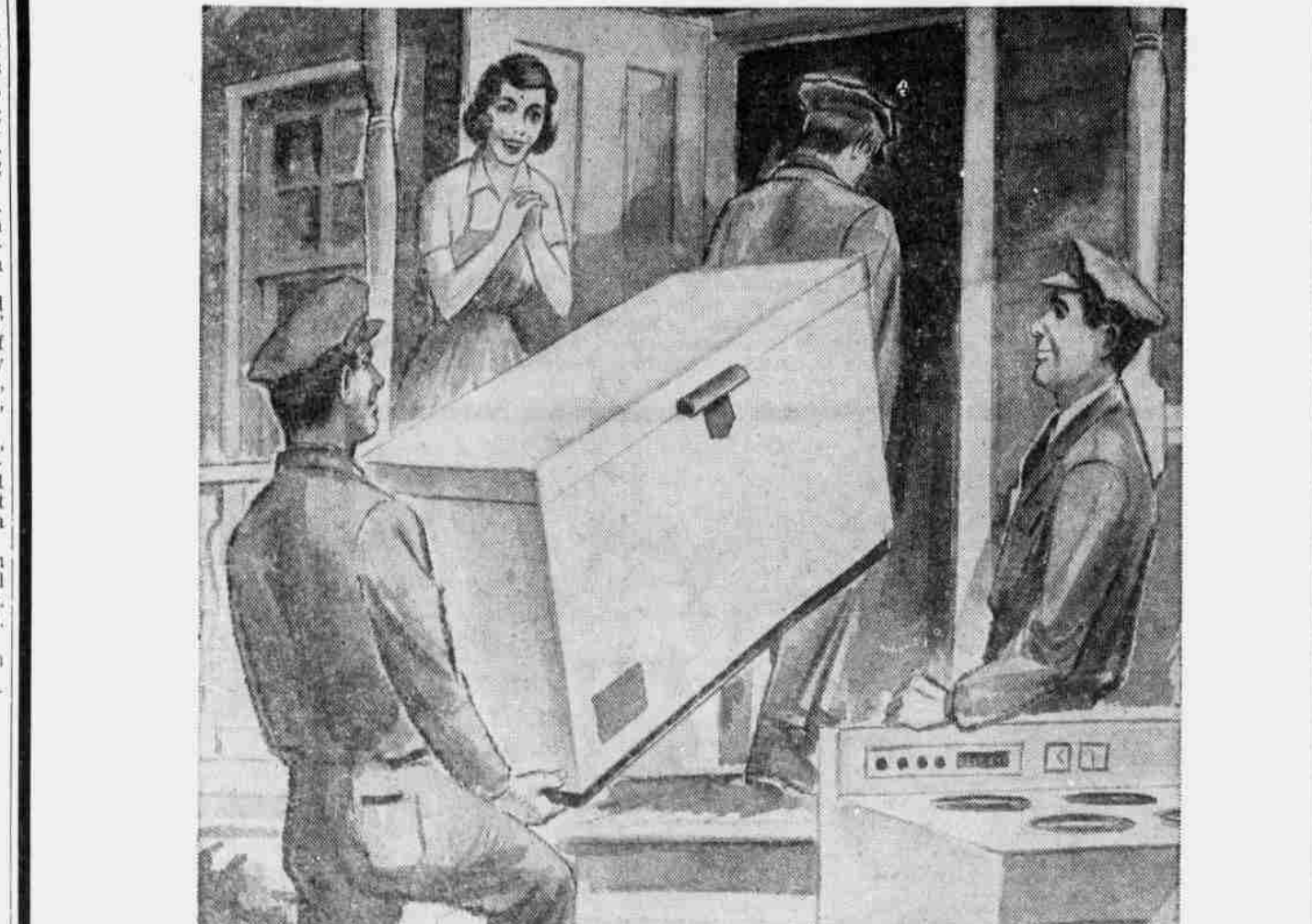
