State Health Board Cuts Water Service

Mrs. Edna Chally, public health nurse, reports that after January 1, 1964, the State Public Health laboratory, Oregon State Board of Health, because of reduced appropriations will perform bacteriological examinations on private water supplies only when such samples have been collected by an authorized person from a city, state or local health department.

It is recommended that the local health department be contacted for assistance in having the water system inspected, and, if deemed necessary, a water sample will be collected and submitted for bacteriological examination.

These restrictions are to assure best use of the available laboratory services following budget reductions resulting from the October 1963 tax referendum.

The local health department can give information of other laboratories available to perform these tests on a commercial basis.
