Southern Hospitality Enjoyed by Delegates

Twenty-six Wheat League members from Oregon were among the 700 or more delegates from 11 different states in attendance. Allen Tom, junior past president of the Oregon Wheat League, was elected vice-president of the National Wheat League and Milton Morgan, president of Oregon Wheat League, was elected to the executive board.

The Ione people enjoyed the southern hospitality of their Texas hosts and lots of entertainment was planned for them. The boys participate in 18 different training programs. They raise cattle and horses and each year give a Rodeo for the public. Although the home is non-denominational, the boys are required to attend religious services each week and by choice 80% of them belong to other church sponsored activities.

3 Pastors Serve On Committee To Plan Conclave

Three Heppner pastors are serving as members of the planning committee of the Oregon Pastors and Lay Leaders conference at Oregon State University January 20-24.

Serving as members of the committee, headed by The Rev. Cyril Dorsett, Newberg, are The Rev. Melvin Dixon, The Rev. Kenneth Robinson and The Rev. Bruce Spencer.

The conference will stress the individual and his church in a changing society and is planned to give clergy and laymen a better understanding of economic and sociological factors affecting the community and their implications for churches.

The conference schedule calls for three basic classes supplemented by elective courses and special evening programs. All conference participants will be enrolled in classes in agriculture and forestry in Oregon's economy, the individual in society and a leadership seminar.

In addition, each person attending may also take one of three elective classes being offered in religion in the novel, the older American and communications. Evening programs will include sessions on recreation activities in church and community, the ministry of music, aging and a film forum.

The three basic classes will all be taught by OSU staff members, as will most of the elective courses. A special instructor will be Mrs. Ada Stout, specialist on aging from the office of aging, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. She will teach the class on the older American and the evening program on "Creative Aging, a Challenge to the Church."

The conference has been planned for town and country pastors, priests, church and community leaders and others interested in church and community leadership. All sessions will be held in the Memorial Union on the Corvallis campus.

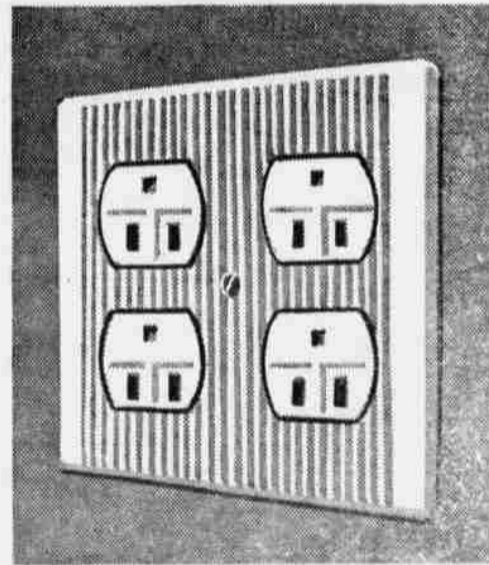
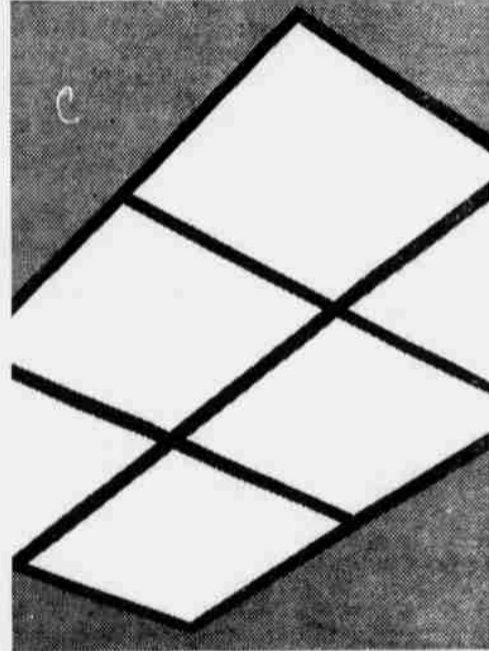
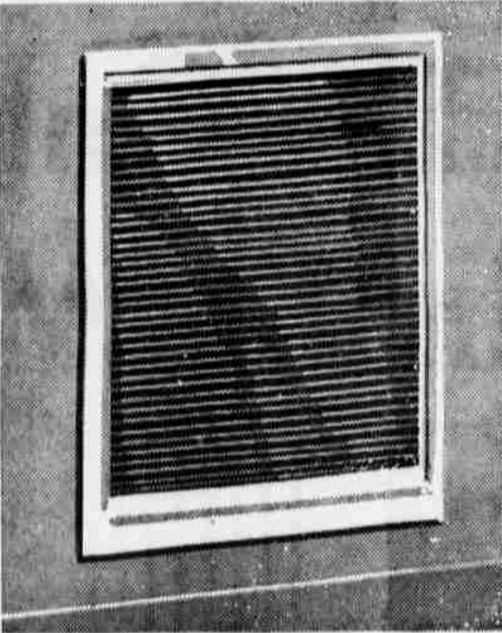
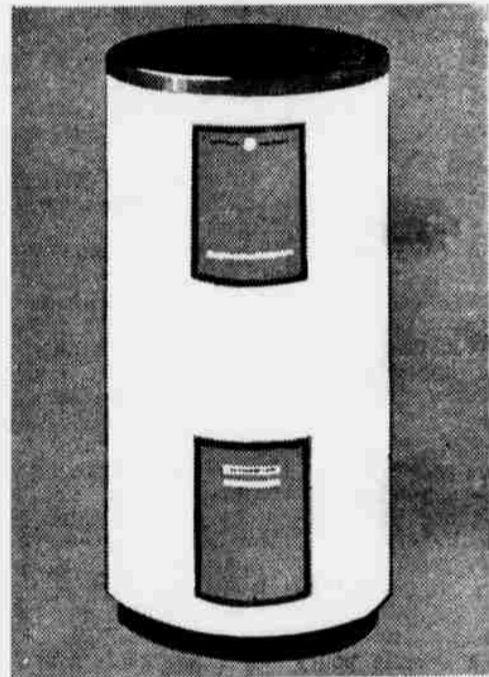
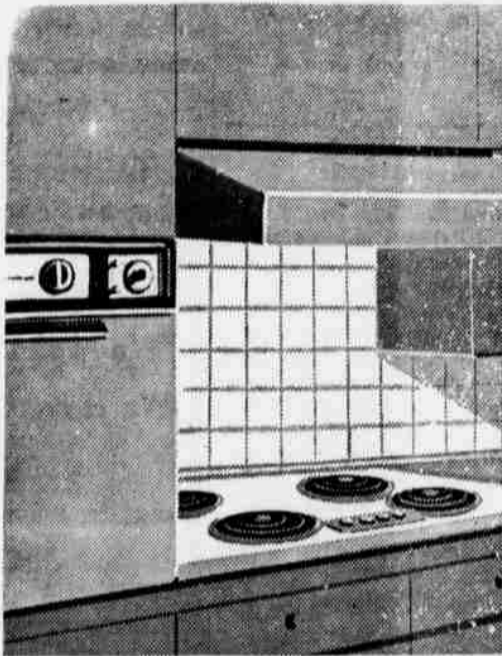
The Friendship club was entertained Wednesday evening at the kitchen with Mrs. Myrna Zitek as hostess. Pinochle was
