

Boardman Mayor Proclaims Heart Month Campaign

BOARDMAN — Mayor Dewey West has designated February as Heart Month in Boardman in a proclamation signed at the city hall.

Throughout Heart Month, the Oregon Heart Association will conduct the 1964 Heart Fund drive here. During Heart Week, February 17-23, members of the Mothers Club of Boardman grade school will visit their neighbors to collect Heart Fund material on the heart contributions and to leave educational material on the heart and blood vessel diseases.

Pointing out that these diseases account for more deaths in Oregon each year than all other causes combined and are the major cause of disability, the mayor called upon all citizens to support the campaign with generous gifts and voluntary services.

The text of the proclamation follows:

WHEREAS the heart and blood vessel diseases including heart attack, stroke and other complications of hardening of the arteries, rheumatic fever, high blood pressure, inborn heart defects and many other cardiovascular ailments, account for more deaths in the U. S. and Oregon than all other causes combined, and are the leading cause of disability; and

WHEREAS the cardiovascular diseases are responsible for over 50% of all deaths in the 45 to 64 year age bracket, the most thereby cause immeasurable suffering, economic hardship and loss to our business and industry; and

WHEREAS Heart Fund dollars make possible a continuing battle against those diseases through programs of research, education and community service carried forward by the Oregon Heart Association an affiliate of the American Heart Association,

THEREFORE I, Mayor of Boardman, proclaim February, 1964 to be Heart Month in this area, and call upon all citizens to support this most worthy health drive with their generous contributions and voluntary services.
