

# City Planning Meeting Slated For Wednesday

IRRIGON—The Planning Commission met Thursday evening to spend more time reviewing future plans for the City of Irrigon, giving special attention to park development along the Columbia River. The public was reminded of a special meeting on February 20, and also of the next meeting with Planning Consultant Joe Kozlovski, to be held at the old Irrigon school on Wednesday evening, February 26, at 7:30 p.m.

Mayor Wilson gave a report on the city water canvass at the evening council meeting last Tuesday and 42 water usage agreements have been received. It is anticipated that the necessary 50 signatures will be obtained by the time the application for a Federal grant has been completed.

Mayor Wilson also reported that a drift fence has been constructed around the landfill, improving the appearance. Mrs. Margeurite Houghton, city recorder, was appointed as the budget officer for the forthcoming budget, and Ordinance No. 10, an improvement ordinance, was read before the council adjourned.
