

Ione Tops Chiefs Easily In Game; Falls to Vikings

Ione High's Cards split a pair last week-end as they rounded out their regular season's play for the 1963-64 basketball campaign. Friday night the Cardinals traveled to Umatilla where they played perhaps their best game of the year in making the Vikings go through two overtimes before the Viks subdued the Redbirds, 71-69. Saturday, the Cardinals took their own floor to host the Umapine Chiefs and coasted easily to a 50-42 victory.

Friday, the Cardinals were in position to beat the Viks for a good portion of the contest but the Umatilla five wasn't in the mood to let the victory go by the wayside.

Ione led at the half, 37-33, after out-gunning the Viks in both the first and second stanzas of the tight contest.

The fourth canto was all Umatilla as the river crew out shot the local club to pull into a 59-59 tie at the end of the game and force the contest into an overtime.

Ione again made a strong bid for the victory during the first extra period, taking a three-point lead, but the Viks had other ideas as they sped back to knot the count and force the tilt into another overtime at 65 all.

Saturday, the Redbirds returned to their home court to meet the Umapine Chiefs, the last place quint in the league.

Ione found the Umapine club to be an easy opponent as the Cards sped to a quick 19-4 first-quarter lead and then coasted to the victory with reserves playing a large portion of the contest. The win left Ione with a seventh place finish in the Umatilla-Morrow league.

Mark Halvorsen and Joe Hausler led the Ione surge as they each connected for 12 points.
