Basic Survey Work Begins

A letter from Bill Johnson, city engineer, was read at the regular monthly meeting of the city council last week, setting up a tentative work schedule to start basic survey work on the new town about March 15, with construction to start in May, and completed this fall.

The council reviewed the relocation schedule and found that it will go along about as set up.

A thank you letter was read from Lyle Wood, vice-president and general manager of the Aerospace Division of the Boeing Company, thanking Boardman for the friendly welcome given them at the ground-breaking ceremonies here.

A report was made by Mayor Dewey West on the recent meeting with the U. S. Corps of Engineers, the state highway department and the Morrow County Court regarding the severance of county roads here when the highway is moved. Both the corps and the state are working on the matter and promised to do something about it. Another meeting will be called April 7.

A check was written to the Northern Pacific Railroad for land purchased for the new town.

The city is now in possession of its policy for liability insurance.

Ernabel Mittelsdorf was elected budget officer for the coming budget meeting, date of which will be set later.

Commission Recommends Plans

The Boardman City Planning Commission has recommended to the city council layout de-

signs 3 and 3-B for the new town. After a discussion on it the council will try to make a decision which one to adopt within the next two weeks.

Ed Kuhn, Vernon Russell and Ernabel Mittelsdorf gave a financial report on the city, stating that the increased population in town since the 1960 census has increased the revenue to the city from state resources.

Seth Russell reported that an irrigation lateral is being built under the highway near town so the city will continue to receive water for irrigation purposes during the changeover of the highway. Also, two more are being built, one east of town and one west to service farmers in those areas.

Dump Problems Arise

Joe Tatone, city council member, has reported to the council that problems are developing at the city dump grounds due to the fact that the grounds are being used by all the surrounding area of the town. The site is financed entirely by tax payers of the city, and a very small amount is in the budget for maintenance of the grounds. Unless some help is obtained from the county the city cannot continue to maintain the site.

A committee consisting of Joe Tatone and Arthur Allen was appointed to meet with the county court regarding the matter.
