

Both Receipts, Expenses to Drop In School Budget

ible school fund through an accumulation of forest monies. For the coming year, this source of receipts will be down to about \$1,800. Not as much is expected either, from the National Defense Education act, but on the other hand, there will not be the need for heavy purchasing of scientific equipment for the schools. Some drop is also expected in receipts from the state in the gifted child and remedial programs.

An increase in receipts under Public Law 874, which concerns itself with federal monies for students living on government lands or whose parents work on government projects, is expected.

In summary on the receipts side, Supt. Brubacher estimated that total budget resources for the general fund now appear at about \$253,000 as compared with \$343,000 a year ago, or a decrease of approximately \$90,000. Part of the decline is due to the decrease in receipts, as explained above, and some is also due to the lower cash carryover expected.

Some of the major items considered in the budget message on the expenditures side were summarized as follows:

Administration—shows an increase of about \$1500, most of which is due to an increase in the superintendent's salary as stipulated in his original contract. An item of \$300 is budgeted to the biennial school census, and a lesser amount is for small increases in salary for the clerk and secretary.

Instructional cost—is up about \$10,000. A major item was the increase to teachers under increments of the salary schedule and the addition of 2 1/7 teachers in the system.

Health services—remains at same figure, \$4600.

Pupil transportation services—will remain about the same, possibly \$1,000 less.

Operation of plant—shows a decrease of \$5,500, most of which will be attributable to cutting operations at Lexington.

Maintenance of plant—down about \$2500.

Fixed charges, insurance—the figure is left the same in the budget.

State Industrial Accident—more than doubled. All rates except cooks, coaches and shop teachers have gone up. Overall raise is figured at \$1000.

Food services—drops about \$2000, most of which is attributable to the withdrawal of Lexington.

Student body activities—exactly the same figure at \$3600.

Capital outlay—down \$40,000 from last year. Figure is placed at \$24,047.

Payments to other districts, tuition—same as last year, \$2000.

Estimated fund for operating contingency (emergency)—placed at same as last year (\$18,000) for the present.

Frank Anderson, Heppner, was reelected chairman of the budget committee, and Mrs. Roland (Donna) Bergstrom, Ione, was reelected secretary.

Other members are James Driscoll and Clint McQuarrie, Heppner; Warren McCoy, Irrigon; Elwynne Peck, Lexington; and Ralph Skoubo, Boardman.

A budget hearing will be held at Irrigon tonight (Thursday) at 8 p.m., another will be at Ione on Monday night, also at 8; and a third will be at Heppner on Friday, March 20, at 8.

Following the meeting Friday, the committee is expected to approve the budget, with amendments made as a result of the hearings, and first publication is scheduled in the Gazette-Times for Thursday, March 26.

A final hearing is scheduled for April 13, and vote on the budget will be May 4.

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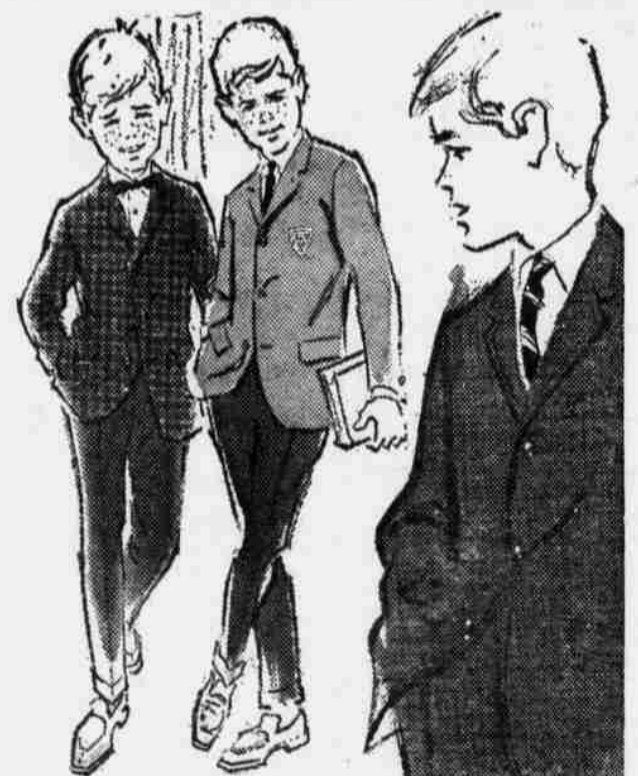
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
