community is cordially invited. The Maranatha club sponsors the breakfast assisted by other women of the church.

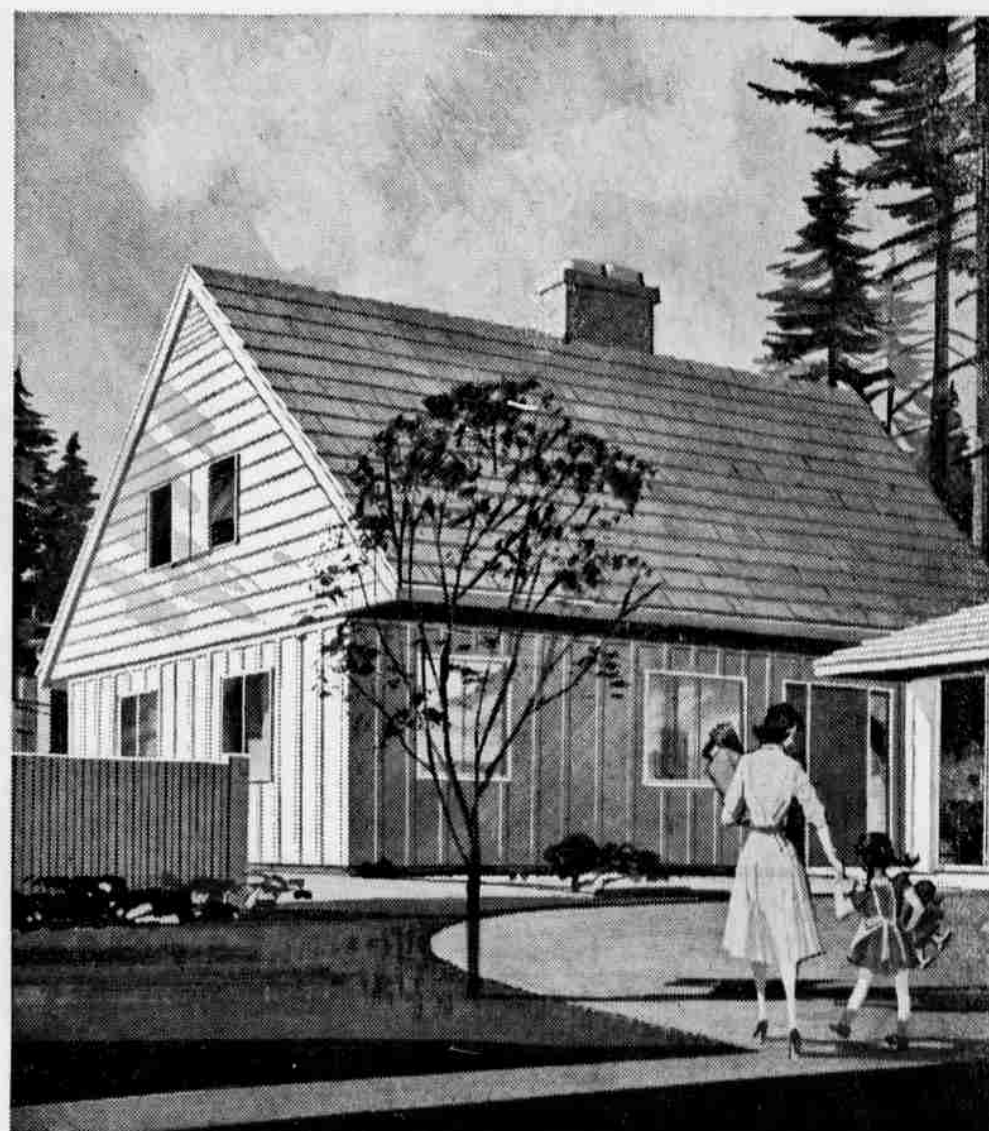
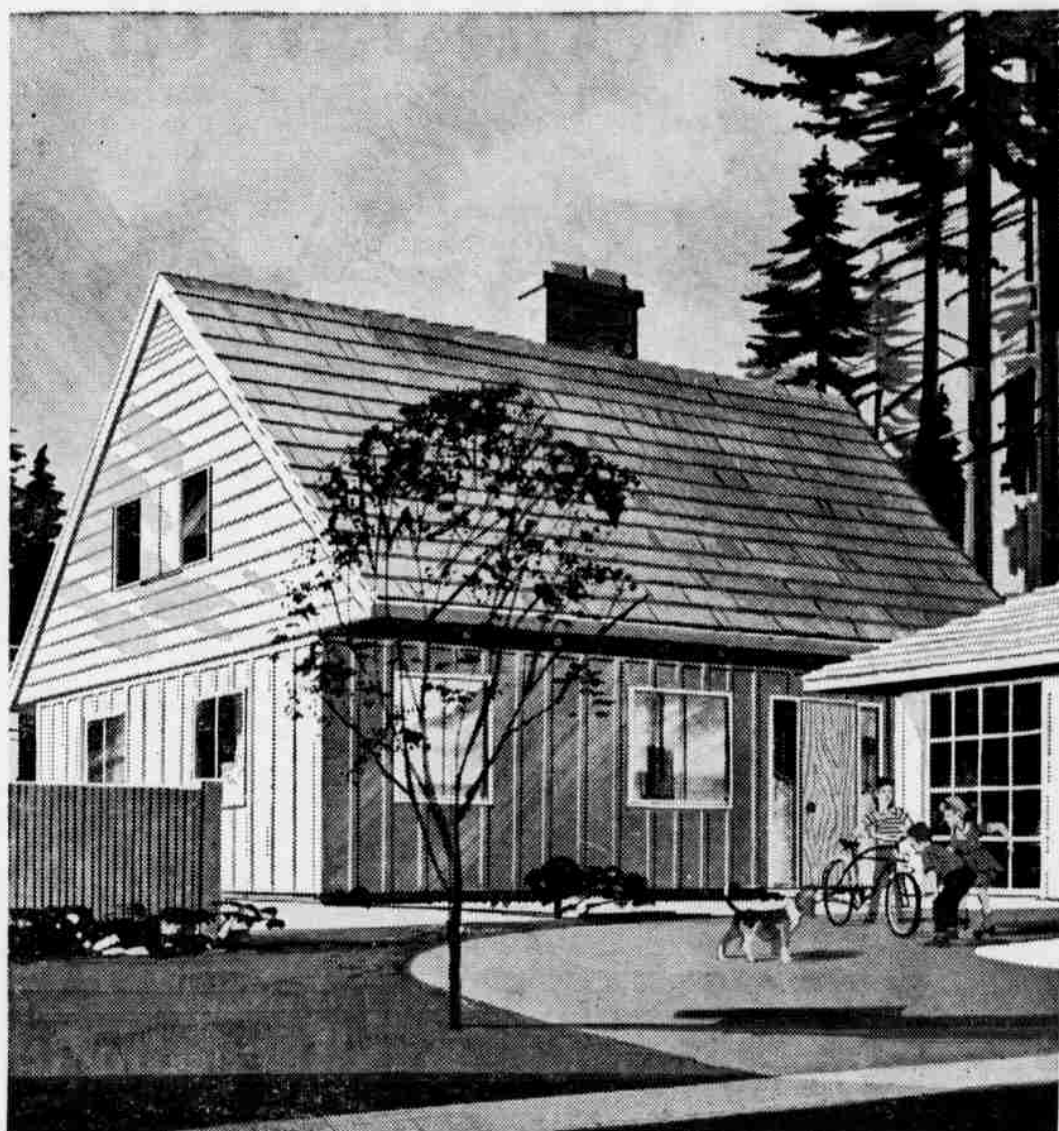
