Twenty charges, eight of them lettermen, greeted Heppner High's baseball coach, Pete Glennie, at the opening of baseball practice, March 2. Thus far, the Mustangs' diamond squad has been working indoors on conditioning exercises and waiting for a break in the weather to allow them to get out doors.

Glennie's squad is anchored by two members of the team which finished third in the league last season, Ken Smith, veteran righthanded pitcher, and Stuart Dick, a hustling infielder with a big bat.

Smith was a stalwart performer for the Mustangs mound corps last year and is counted heavily in their present plans. He mowed down the enemy battery on many occasions with his precision hurling.

Dick is a whiz at the plate. Last campaign he swatted the ball at a .360 pace to lead his teammates in the hit department.

Also, in the Heppner pitching picture is Bill Snyder, a sharp sophomore who needs only experience to be a top mound performer, and Dave Anderson, a junior flinger, who is having a go at the pitching duties.

Heppner will field a veteran infield for the coming season and the outfield will consist of lettermen who have seen limited duty until this year. If the outfield jells, the Mustangs will be a tough team to overhaul.
