

Port Commission Presents Budget

BOARDMAN—The first budget meeting of the Morrow County Port Commission was held at the city hall last Thursday night with Commissioners Al Lamb, Heppner, Gar Swanson, Ione, Dick Krebs, Cecil, and Dewey West present with other members of the budget committee, who are Jack Hynds, Cecil, Roy Lindstrom, Ione, Harlan McCurdy, Heppner, and Vernon Russell. West was elected president of the committee, and Al Lamb secretary.

A report was read to the committee of the policy of the commission for the coming year and the expenditures and program of the port.

The budget was prepared and was held below the six per cent limitation, with no bonded indebtedness or special levies.

West briefly reviewed the port activities for the past year, their acquisition of waterfront lands for port dockage and industrial lands, and also commended the commissioners for their public service the past year, inasmuch as the port has no paid personnel. The work has all been done by the commissioners.

Lamb announced that Rep. Al Ullman planned to be at the city hall March 24 to discuss city relocation problems and the Port of Morrow waterfront land use.

Frank Warren of Hermiston was present to discuss buying land owned by the Port. Lloyd Berger of Irrigon, candidate for port commissioner, was also present.

The next budget meeting will be held April 2 at 8 p.m.

City Plans Taking Shape

Another combined meeting of the Boardman City Council, the City Planning Commission and the businessmen of the town was held last week with Holly Cornish and Wayne Phillips of Seattle, Wn., from the firm of Cornish, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, and Jim Payne, architect from Salem. Also present was M. D.

Van Valkenburgh, city attorney, The Dalles.

Architectural designs for the commercial area of the new town were shown and ideas discussed. Cornell gave a report on the planning and survey work, and reviewed the relocation work and its progress. The schedule calls for construction to start about the last of May. A lot of interest is being shown on the part of the businessmen and others.

Mayor Dewey West was authorized to send out letters to the utility companies inviting them to a meeting some time the first week in April. It will have to be known by April 10 where the different utilities will be situated in the new town.

Van Valkenburgh discussed bringing up to date the codifying of the city ordinances and the adoption of sub-division, zoning and building codes. He reported them ready for adoption.

Shirley Zielinski was hired to work as an assistant to Ernabe Mittelsdorf, city recorder, for the next few weeks.

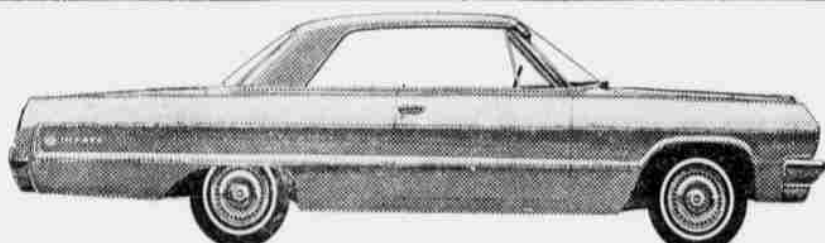

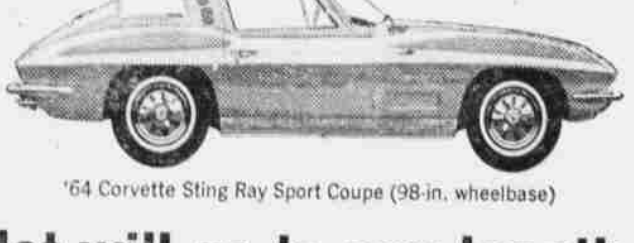
