The double ring ceremony was read at 2:00 p.m. in the presence of relatives and close friends, with the Rev. Charles Knox officiating. A tall standard holding yellow gladioli and greenery accented by a yellow satin bow and streamers, stood by the altar. Lighting tapers on the altar were John Van Winkle, brother of the bride, and LaVerne Van Marter, III.

Given in marriage by her father, the bride wore a street length dress of pure white silk, fashioned with an A-line skirt, a short Empire jacket edged in Italian lace and a floating panel accenting the back. Heppner Teacher Involved in Crash

Rex English, Heppner High school teacher, was in an accident between Canyon City and John Day Saturday night that involved the 1-ton truck he was driving and a pickup truck which was occupied by a man and a woman who lived in that area. The woman, identified as Mrs. Velda Schwick, was killed in the accident.

English, alone in his truck, escaped serious injury, and William Nisley, companion of the woman in the pickup, also apparently was unhurt. Three horses in English's truck were thrown from the vehicle and sustained some scratches and lacerations.

The Heppner man said that he had stopped at the farm place with the load of horses and had started to back out of a driveway, intending to take the horses across the highway to a corral on the other side. The rear of the truck was on the shoulder but did not extend on to the highway, he said.

English said that he stopped and could not see a vehicle in sight. Suddenly lights of the oncoming vehicle loomed up, and he could see it veering to the highway shoulder. He estimated the speed of the pickup at about 70 miles per hour and recognized that it was headed for the rear of his truck.

The impact threw him some 20 or 30 feet from the truck, tore off the bed, bent the frame and threw the horses out. The pickup was demolished, careened down the highway and came to rest in another driveway across the highway.

Mrs. Schwick apparently was killed outright. Neither she nor Nisley were thrown from the vehicle, English said.

Ione Postmaster Exam Scheduled

An examination for postmaster at Ione, \$5500 a year, will be open for acceptance of applications until April 7, 1964, the U. S. Civil Service Commission announced today.

Mrs. Charles (June) O'Connor is acting postmaster, having served since retirement last summer of Ruby Roberts, postmaster for more than 40 years. Mrs. O'Connor will be among those taking the examination.

Competitors for the postmaster vacancy must have at least one year of experience (education above high school level may be substituted for six months of experience) showing that they have the ability to maintain simple records of accounts or that it has given them a knowledge of postal procedures.

Applicants must take a written test. Those who pass will be assigned final ratings on the basis of this test and on their experience, and fitness for the position. They must have resided within the delivery of the post office for one year immediately preceding the closing date of the examination. In addition, they must have reached their 18th birthday on the closing date for acceptance of application. Persons over 70 years of age cannot be appointed.
