The travelogue through Alaska by Miss McCarter brought timely enjoyment to those present. Her travels took her through Mt. McKinley National park, to Fairbanks, and return trip to the states over the Alcan highway.

Miss McCarter was saddened to see on the fatality list of those killed in Anchorage at the time of the earthquake, the name of the teacher who replaced her as physical education and biology teacher in the high school there. Miss McCarter is completing her second year here as P.E. and biology teacher.
