

Former Irrigon Man Dies on Job

IRRIGON — Ralph Walpole, former Irrigon resident, died last Wednesday while working on a utility pole, on highway 30, just east of Clatskanie, where the Walpoles resided. Walpole was on his job with the West Coast Telephone Company.

He had gone on the call from the local office shortly before 4:30 p.m., and according to available reports, a driver of an oil truck saw him on the pole and realized something was wrong. He hailed a car and asked the driver to call for help. The call went into the local phone office about four minutes to 5:00.

Dr. Otto George and the Haakinson ambulance and the PUD crew were called out to the scene and Lewis Peterson and Don Anderson brought the body down from the pole. Services were held in Riverview Abbey in Portland.

Mayor Proclaims Clean-up Week, Adopts Resolutions

Mayor Chester Wilson proclaimed the week of April 26 to May 2 as "Clean-up Week" for the City of Irrigon at the April Council meeting. He stated: "In keeping with other communities and civic organizations at this time of year, a proclamation is hereby issued designating the week of April 26 to May 2, 1964, as clean-up week for the City of Irrigon. These forms will now go back to Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, consulting engineers in Seattle, who in turn will file them with the Federal Agency. It is hoped that grant funds will be made available soon.

Speaker Reveals SBA Aid Available

BOARDMAN—Delmer Putnam of Portland, representative of the Small Business Administration, met with a group of about 20 persons at the city hall one night last week to discuss Displaced Business Disaster Loans. Putnam was introduced by Gus Fisher of Hermiston, who with Waid DeVore of Hermiston, Mayor Dewey West and Harold Baker, were instrumental in getting him to come here. Joe Norton of Hermiston was also present.

Putnam explained the SBA financing program, and brought out that Boardman area people would qualify for SBA aid. He indicated funds were available and applications could be processed in about 30 days. Property owners could obtain this loan at 3 3/8% interest. Businessmen who rent property would not be eligible for this rate, but could get loans under the conventional program at 5 1/2%. If this is still a distressed unemployment area, then the loan could be obtained at 4%. These loans would apply to all businesses that will have to be moved to the new townsite when water is backed up by the John Day dam.
