JUSTICE OF THE PEACE DUTIES EXPLAINED

I have been running for the non-partisan office of Justice of the Peace, Morrow County 6th District, on the strength of the fact that I know the requirements of the office. I feel my long interest in law and justice, my training as a reporter and correspondent, and my educational background qualify me for the position.

Apparently some misunderstanding of the duties of the office exists.

FOR THE RECORD:

- Other candidates for this office have mentioned "counseling." a. Juvenile counseling is not a duty of the Justice of the Peace. A juvenile officer is employed by the county at an annual salary of \$1800 for this purpose. The Justice of the Peace is paid \$3000 for the many duties involved in that office. District Attorney Herman Winter reports youths over 16 are remanded to Justice court "for sentencing only" in cases involving traffic or alcoholic offenses. This is with the stipulation that such youths be treated as adults.
- Nor is there any "counseling" as such connected with duties of the Justice in adult cases brought to the court. Interest of the justice centers on whether or not the law has been broken, the circumstances surrounding the case, and the sentence required.
- One of those running for the office has stated several times "I would rely heavily on the district attorney." Anyone holding the office is required by law to do so. However, there are times when the district attorney represents the state and another attorney represents the accused in a court trial. In these instances the justice must be capable of reaching decisions without advice of the district attorney.
- Oregon law requires that the same officer elected as Justice of the Peace preside at Court of small Claims as well as at the Justice court. In this capacity there is some room for "counseling" but only on a financial basis.
- Duties of the Justice of the Peace in Oregon are outlined in a manual which makes it possible for anyone to clearly understand just what is involved. A schedule of fees for bail on traffic violations is supplied by the Oregon Supreme Court. It is the duty of each justice to adopt these indicated procedures to each individual case. I feel I am capable of filling these requirements in a fair and unbiased manner and of administering the office with justice to all.
