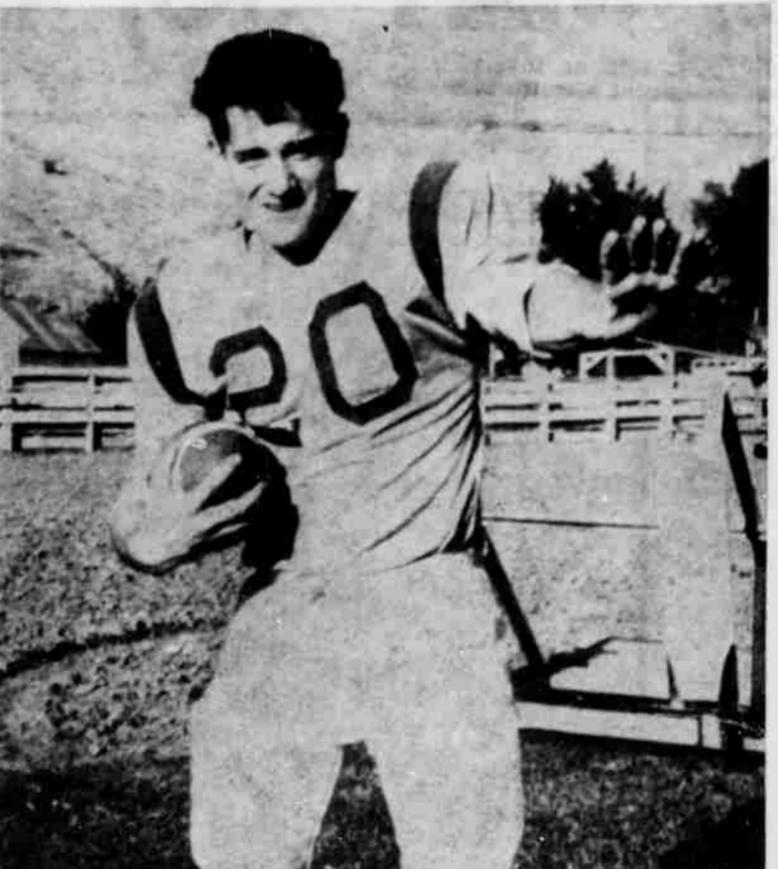

MOST VALUABLE PLAYER



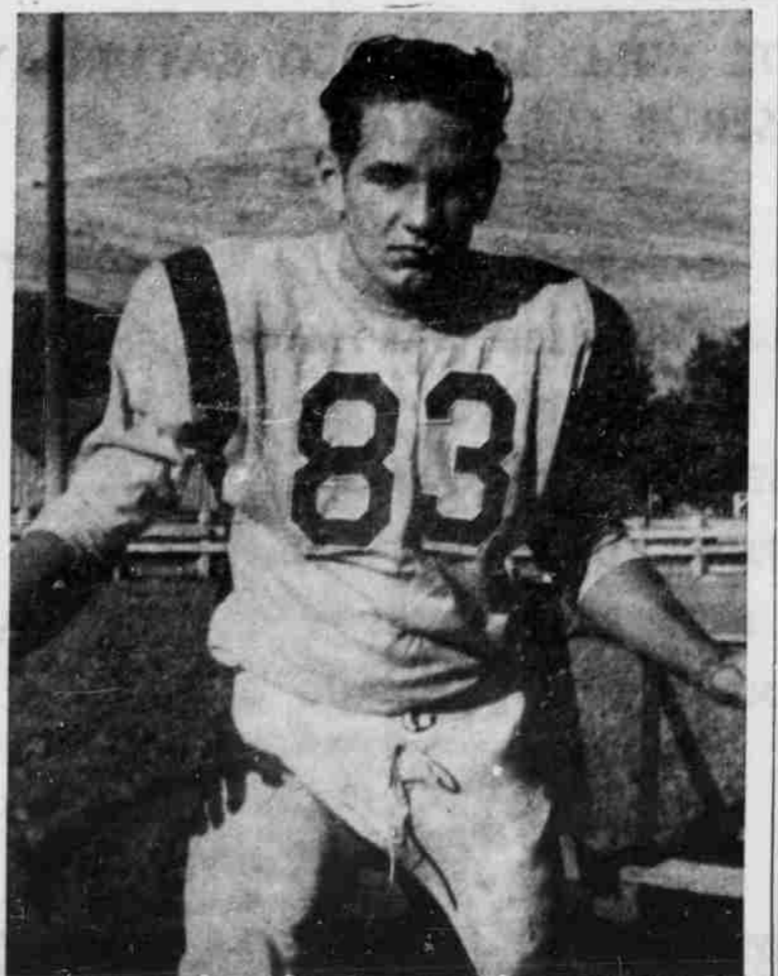

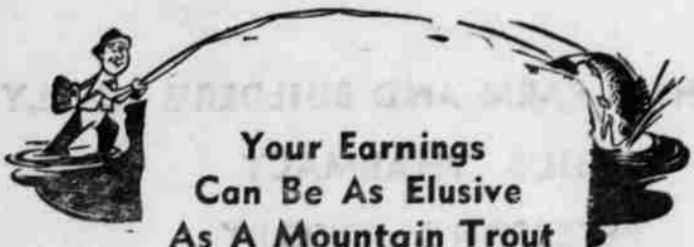
