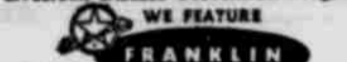

More exhibitors with wheat fed steers, lambs and hogs than those who showed their livestock at last year's Junior Livestock show of the Oregon Wheat Growers League are expected for the 18th annual show Sunday through Wednesday, June 7-10.
