Make With Wool Contest Underway

District entries for the annual "Make-it-Yourself With Wool" sewing contest are again being received, according to Mrs. Robert Hoskins, district director. The district contest will be held in Pendleton on October 31. Sponsors of the contest are the Women's Auxiliary to the National Wool Growers Assoc. and the American Wool Council.

Restrictions and rules of the contest include that workmanship must all be done by the contestant; it must have been completed since February 1, 1964; entry must be made of 100% wool and entered in the correct age bracket—determined by entrant's age December 1, 1964. These include Division A—girls 10 to 13 inclusive (formerly Sub-Debs); Division B—girls 14 to 17 inclusive (formerly Juniors), and Division C—girls 18 to 21 inclusive (formerly Seniors).

Student Scores 'Dual Standards' In Salutatory

(Editor's note: Because of trouble with the speaking system during the salutatory address by Tom Heimbigner at lone High commencement recently, most of the audience could not hear much of his talk. For that reason, excerpts are printed here).

SALUTATORIAN ADDRESS BY TOM HEIMBIGNER

We all know that nobody can look into the future and foretell exactly what is going to accrue at some far distant moment, but we can certainly all be aware of a definite trend that is apparent in this great land of ours which, to all apparent purposes, is irreversibly entrenched in our society.

It is you and I, my fellow classmates, who have the opportunity to shape the future into a mood which, at least in my estimation, is more compatible with the ideals and traditions of our forefathers than the road we are now following.

We are existing today in what great minds have presumptuously termed the "cold war," implying that there is no fighting, no death, no sorrow or the other subsequent ramifications which spring forth from such a full scale encounter. Yet, virtually every day I pick up the paper and see where more United States soldiers, who are fine young Americans just like my very good friends Dick and Steve here, have been killed in another onslaught staged by the Communist Viet Cong! And still they have the fortitude to call it a "cold war!"

Our government spends billions of dollars a year on the space race and on bigger bombs. They're now on the verge of completing the development of a cobalt bomb, a bomb so destructive that four or five of them would destroy this entire planet. All this money they've spent, and for what? Things that in all probability will never be utilized!

And all the while, the world is filled with poverty and disease, the efforts to ameliorate the sordid living conditions of the masses are met with animadversion from nearly every level of society.

When I think of the good those billions upon billions of dollars could do in the field of medical research alone, I must confess that I have not yet reached a level of education which permits me to fully comprehend the reasoning of the adults in our society who make this type of decision.

Adults spend millions of dollars concerning the necessity of physical fitness in the youth of our nation and then lock the gymnasium and playground equipment so that the nation's youth cannot use them. They prove that cigarette smoking is a form of suicide and then hire cigarette smokers to teach physical fitness courses!

I see examples everyday of people simply ignoring this type of thing as if it didn't exist. This dual standard type of delusion is so firmly entrenched in our culture that many of you listening to me now are pro-
