

Boardman Signs \$380,000 Utility Contract

BOARDMAN — The first contract, which is for replacing of city utilities for the new town-site, was signed Monday at the city hall between the City of Boardman and the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers. Representing the corps were Major Edwin J. Williams, division engineer, and Bill Donner, legal counsel for the corps, both from Walla Walla, Wn.

Prior to the signing a special meeting was called of the city council by Mayor Dewey West for the purpose of adopting a resolution for negotiating the contract with the Corps of Engineers. It was voted unanimously by the council.

This contract covers replacement of streets, drainage, and the water system. It is hoped that the second contract will be negotiated in about two weeks. It will be for replacement of the city structures, which includes the City Hall, fire station, park, and boat ramp, also the trees in the town.

The cost for the contract signed first is estimated at about \$380,000. The second one will be \$70,000. Cost of the sewer system, which the government will not replace, has been estimated at \$200,000. Other incidental costs will be \$50,000, making the overall cost at about three-fourths of a million dollars.

Also present at the signing

were Milt Moran, chairman of the Morrow County School board from Ione, Irvin Rauch, school board member, Lexington, Wayne Brubacher, county school superintendent, Heppner, and Louisa Kincaid, Madras, president of the city planning commission, who is a property owner here. Several members of the Boardman city planning commission were also present.

Relocation Schedule Outlined

A public meeting on the relocation of the City of Boardman was held Tuesday evening of last week in the school cafeteria. The meeting was called by the city council, the planning commission and the urban renewal agency to acquaint the people as to the progress of what has been done so far about the new town. Bill Johnson of the firm of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, Seattle, Wn., was present and gave an outline of the program so far and possible costs.

William B. Culham, Portland, district sanitarian from the state board of health, was present to discuss a new community sewage system, which will have to be built by the city, as the government will not provide a new one, since there is none now in the present town.

Survey work is now underway on the new townsite, and an official plat of the first 50-acre

portion should be filed by July 15. This land will be available to individuals at this time. The remaining 30-acre tract will not be available until about November 1, 1964.

The initial plat will include about 20 commercial sites and approximately 30 homesites. An additional 60 residential lots will be available in November.

The following schedule of events is anticipated and every effort is being expended to meet these schedules:

June, 1964 — Complete negotiations with the Corps of Engineers.

July, 1964 — Approval of Corps' contract.

July — File townsite plats.

July — Begin well construction.

October, 1964 — Begin construction of utilities.

November, 1964 — Complete well construction.

December — Begin construction of City Hall.

December — Earliest date to begin relocation of businesses.

January — Earliest date for rerouting highway traffic.

March, 1965 — Complete utility and city hall construction.

March — Local businesses open at new site.

March — Earliest date to begin residential relocation.

June, 1967 — Existing town vacation for clearing for the John Day Dam pool.
