

Kennedy Urges 'Good Hard Look' At Wildlife Plan

Rupert Kennedy, executive secretary of the Mid-Columbia Planning Council, suggested that the people of Morrow county "take a good hard look" at the Federal government's plan to establish a 7,000-acre wildlife refuge on the Columbia River waterfront when he spoke briefly at the June 1 meeting of the Heppner-Morrow county Chamber of Commerce.

He said that there are 100,000 acres of tax-free land in the Boeing site, and that 8600 acres went to the Umatilla Army Depot, as well as the acreage in the navy bomb range that is off the tax roll.

"Since you have done so much already, I think it is someone else's turn."

The land that would be used for the refuge includes some "extremely fine" industrial sites, he said.

Some time ago the Chamber of Commerce went on record as opposing the wildlife refuge.

Kennedy said that progress is being made by the Mid-Columbia Council. With a budget of \$12,000 this year, it is planned to extend it to \$18,000 per year. Colored brochures are being printed and some contacts have been made to attract new industries to the six-county area.

"With the proper tools, I feel we will attract prospects," he said, although maybe as little as 25% of the contacts will result in success.

"This year points up the need for diversity," Kennedy said. "If you are diversified, you can go through the hills and valleys."

The executive secretary congratulated the county for its foresight in planning and said that his main interest is providing jobs for young people needing work here. He pointed out that one million newly married couples will be starting out in 1965, comprising the "greatest market we have ever had."

"We have been sending them to California, but for every war baby here, California has six," he declared.

Judge Oscar Peterson pointed out that the county zoning and planning commission, together with the county court, park committee and port commission, has prepared maps which will be able to show zones and be able to hold a hearing with the Army Corps of Engineers in regard to the proposed wildlife site.

President Al Lamb, who left for Washington, D. C., Tuesday planned to check on the proposed refuge while in the capital.

At the meeting, Oliver Creswick, chairman of the development committee, said that the committee has drawn up resolutions that it was scheduled to present to the county court Wednesday, asking for an all-weather road via Jones Prairie and Western Road towards Ukiah to the Umatilla county line. It urged approval of a special use permit of the U. S. Forest Service for the road, requested that the court complete acquisition of a right of way from John French, that the county set up a rock crusher adjacent to the road for materials to use on the road, and that it enlist the cooperation of Kinzua Corporation in developing the road.

"We believe that this is one of the keys to the development of southern Morrow county," Creswick said.

Pratt is Enrolled For Summer Session

Gordon Pratt, Heppner High school principal, has enrolled for the summer session at the University of Colorado at Boulder beginning after July 1. He will work towards his doctor's degree in education there.

Mrs. Pratt and the family will accompany him there where they plan to find a residence through the remainder of the summer.

Lee Padberg, Heppner High school athlete, captured fifth place in the mile at the state A-2 track and field meet in Corvallis Saturday. Padberg, a gritty runner who three weeks prior to the meet underwent an appendectomy, stayed with the pacer for three laps but tired in the stretch to clock a 4:35.0 time in the race. The winning time in the mile was a 4:29.0.

The Heppner athlete also ran in the 880 but didn't place due to his sore side. In the Friday preliminaries to the meet, he paced his heat in the 880 with a fine 2:01.3 clocking.

His time in that preliminary heat is the fastest ever turned in by a Heppner athlete in the 880.

Don McClure, Padberg's coach at Heppner High for three years, said that he felt that if the Heppner athlete had not had the attack of appendicitis, he would have won both events in the state meet. However, Padberg's performance can be called an excellent one, even for an athlete without a very sore side!
