Commission Okays Irrigon Park Plans

IRRIGON — The Irrigon Planning Commission met Thursday evening with Judge Oscar Peterson and Clarence Rosewall, chairman of the County Planning Commission. The Irrigon Planning Commission, presided over by chairman James Keith, presented their proposed park and recreational planning, and Rosewall displayed a land use zoning map approved by the Commission. The county court and the parks and port commissions. The map gave a detailed picture of future development throughout the county. It was determined that there was no conflict between the planning of the city and of the county. Petitions are currently being circulated in Irrigon for the formation of a Park and Recreation Maintenance district. It is anticipated that the Corps of Engineers will construct park facilities along the river, adjacent to the present boat landing, and they need to be assured that any constructed facilities will be properly maintained. The boundaries for the proposed Maintenance District are the same as those for the Irrigon Cemetery District. The petitions will be filed with the county court in the near future.
