Miss Ginny Lou Turner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Donald E. Turner, Lexington, received her diploma from St. Paul's School for Girls in Walla Walla, Wn., Monday morning, June 1. Miss Turner has served as vice president of the student body during the year.

Another student of the school is Pamela Proudfoot, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Proudfoot, lone, who has just completed her freshman year.

The recent 92nd Commencement of the school was also the last one under the administration of Miss Hedwig Zorb, headmistress. Since 1921, Miss Zorb has been affiliated with the pioneer college preparatory

school which was founded in 1872 during Washington Territorial days by an Episcopal missionary, the Rev. Lemuel H. Wells. A progressive administrator, Miss Zorb has been head of the school since 1942.

Commencement week-end started with Class Day exercises on the school campus, May 30. Scholastic honors were announced and a varied program of drama, dancing and physical education activities was presented. Parents, faculty, students and friends of the school attended the Class Day dinner in the evening. Miss Zorb was the featured speaker. The senior class presented the school with an oil portrait of Miss Zorb.

The Hedwig Zorb Development Fund was announced which will be part of the preparations for the 100th anniversary of the school in 1972.

Baccalaureate service was held in St. Paul's Episcopal church, May 31, with the Rt. Rev. Russell Sturgis Hubbard, Bishop of Spokane and Rector of the school, delivering the sermon.

Rabbi Emanuel Rose of the Congregation Beth Israel in Portland gave the address at the Commencement exercises also held in St. Paul's church on Monday morning, June 1.

Miss Zorb plans to maintain her permanent home at Hurricane Creek in the Wallawa Mountains near Joseph and to spend her summers there.
