## Families Urged To Talk, Follow Safe Swim Tips

Family conferences on safe swimming—in advance of vacation and beach trips—are suggested by an Oregon State University recreation leader as a means of "life saving."

It is estimated that some 7000 persons will drown this summer and it is certain that this terrible toll could be drastically reduced with more attention to water safety, says Edward J. Slezak, chairman of recreation in the OSU division of physical education.

Parents are urged to talk over water safety with their children. Caution can keep out tragedy, he reminds.

Here are Slezak's safe-swimming rules:

Never swim alone. Enter the water gradually and never turn your back to surf waters.

Swim only in guarded or safe areas.

Refrain from swimming too soon after meals.

Observe all beach and pool rules.

Have a boat and two good swimmers escort you on long swims.

Never call for help unless needed.

Listen to instructions from pool and beach guards or lake directors.

Slezak adds one caution for boaters: "Never overload boats or canoes and always wear life jackets."
