Area Rain Brings Crop Improvement

After an inspection of the grain crops throughout the majority of the county, N. C. Anderson, Morrow county agent, reports "The recent rains have been worth a million dollars to the grain growers in the county."

May, 1964, was the driest May on record but, "No farmer lost his entire crop," Anderson said. "Of course some suffered more than others and it is felt that the Juniper Canyon area north of Lexington suffered as bad as any place."

"Three weeks ago the grain production picture was not a good one," the agent said, "But the rains we have had in the past two weeks have certainly made an improvement." "These rains have increased the potential for crops from here on out," he continued. "And it is too late for rust to cause damage."

Anderson stated, "Unless the weather turns too hot and windy for spring planting we will have 25 bushels to the acre wheat crops and 1500 pounds to the acre of barley on a countywide basis."

"Last year's yield was 34 bushels of wheat and the average year is about 30 bushels," the agent stated.

Anderson predicted that this wheat crop should bring in excess of \$5 million and a barley crop worth more than \$1 million.

Tests Possible By Year's End

Boeing company will have more than \$1.5 million invested in the Boardman space-age park by October, John Olmer, Seattle, community relations manager for the firm, said Tuesday.

Olmer said that the company is now building test complex No. 1, to test propulsion systems using high-energy propellants, on the site.

Construction of a test-stand and support facilities started the first of this month. The test stand will be able to handle static tests on engines producing up to 100,000 pounds of thrust with the engine tied in a vertical position on the upper deck. Higher thrusts will be handled on the lower deck of the stand.

Support facilities at the site will include a pumphouse for observation and office spaces.

Olmer said that the facilities should be completed by October and Boeing expects to conduct first tests with rocket fuel before the end of the current year. Additional facilities for the site, along with more test stands are possible, depending on Boeing's business developments along that line, Olmer said.

He said that Boeing expects to have about 35 people working on the site when the tests start.

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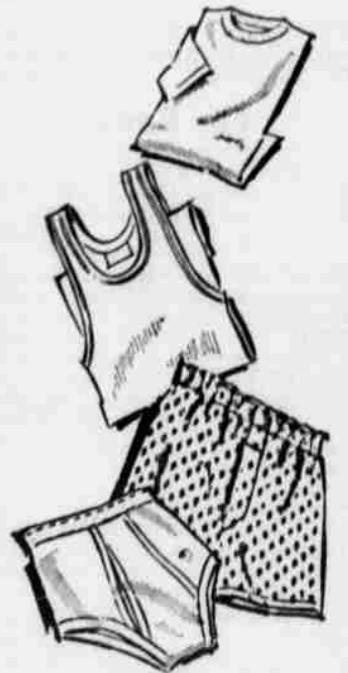
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
