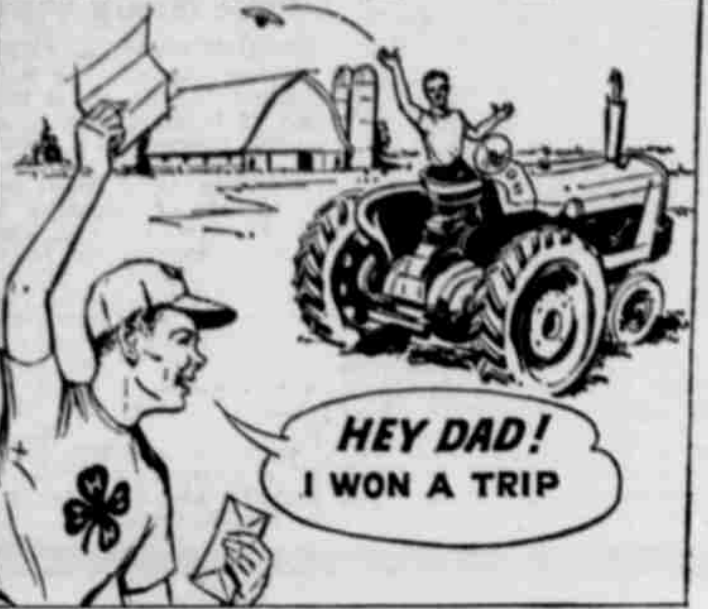


300% Increase In 4-H Agricultural Awards



It will soon be awards time in 4-H, and this year should see nearly 3,000 winners added to the steadily growing list of top-rated agricultural club members.

Fifty of the 800,000 boys and girls enrolled in the national 4-H Agricultural program will win a free trip to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago next November. Six will receive a \$500 scholarship and the remainder will merit county medals.

Delegates to the Congress will help to celebrate 10 years of sponsorship by International Harvester in this particular program. However, the company has supported 4-H in several areas since 1919, according to the National 4-H Service Committee.

Agricultural projects undertaken by 4-H'ers throughout the state help to improve the home farm and to prepare the way for future jobs on and off the farm.

Local 4-H Club leaders, county and state extension workers, parents and residents of the community all have a share in helping the youngsters select and complete one of the many projects in the agricultural program.

The county extension office can supply additional information about joining a 4-H Club or organizing a new one.

Pendleton '100' Air Race Offers Thrills, Stunts

Deafening roar of combat fighter planes and the comparative putt-putt of early day planes, breathtaking stunts, a car-to-plane transfer, regularly scheduled landings of big commercial airlines, pleasure rides in helicopters and a multi-engine aircraft—all these are part of the array of entertainment awaiting spectators at the Pendleton "100" International Championship Stock Airplane Races starting Saturday, June 27, at the Pendleton Municipal Airport.

Top pilots from across this country and Canada will guide their hurtling ships, about 50 feet off the ground, around a four-mile course, keeping only a hairbreadth away from the pylons that mark the perimeter of the closed course.

Spectators will view the entire race, and all other activities, from start to finish from their vantage point right in the center of the airport where parking has been arranged for 4,500 cars and 1,000 private planes.

In this aerial classic, which is comparable to the Daytona stock car race or the Indianapolis "500" except that these are planes and they follow the same circular race course but in the air, entries are indicated from 13 states and those already received include four of the top pilots in the U. S. and Canada.

But, back to the spine-tingling air show—two P-51 Mustangs, said by many combat pilots to be World War II's best airplane, will rev up their mighty engines and put on what's been called one of the most outstanding aerobic demonstrations in the country.

The Mustangs will appear both Saturday and Sunday. Friday is the day set aside exclusively for the qualification and timing of the race pilots while Saturday and Sunday will feature the heats, the final "100" and the thrilling air show. Gates open at 10 a.m. each day.

House Trailer Use Climbs in Morrow

Oregon counties are now receiving checks with their share of the 1964 house trailer tax, according to Vern L. Hill, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Hill said counties will receive \$1,094,694 this year, an increase of \$262,776 over the 1963 distribution.

Morrow county's share of the collection, based on 250 house trailer applications, is \$5,873.36. This compares with \$3,372.91 received last year for 174 applications.

The fee is collected by the department in lieu of a property tax on house trailers, along with a flat \$6 license charge. The fee is based on two per cent of the market value of the trailer.
