## Ullman Urges Buying Of Utility Cows

Congressman Al Ullman joined with three other members of the House Ways and Means Committee last week in calling on Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to emphasize the purchase of utility cows in present beef purchasing programs of the federal government.

Ullman, joined by Congressman Pat Jennings (D. Va.), Clark Thompson (D. Tex.), and John Watts (D. Ky.), wrote Secretary Freeman as a follow up to the Ways and Means Committee hearings with the Secretary on June 4 on beef imports.

The Eastern Oregon Congressman, who has been leading in efforts to obtain import relief for the cattle industry, pointed out that in addition to the import problem, depressed cattle prices have been caused by the increase in cattle population at the present time. Higher prices for cow beef would encourage ranchers to sell cows rather than hold them to produce another calf.

## County to Bear Cost Of Freeway Access Road

BOARDMAN — A decision was reached at a meeting here last week whereby Morrow county will have to pay for a connecting access road between the Boeing airport interchange and the Bombing Range interchange on the new freeway which will be built. At the meeting were Judge Oscar Peterson, Commissioners Gene Ferguson, Heppner, and Walter Hayes, Boardman; Harold Shirer, county road master; H. S. Cox, state highway commission county-wide relations man, Salem; Robert J. Cole, contracts and legal administrator for Boeing Company, Seattle; Mayor Dewey West, councilman Arthur Allen, Vernon Russell, and Joe Tatone; Dale Eades and Rollo Moore, land owners.

Cox informed the court that the state provided no funds for building such a road. The county has been trying to get an agreement with the state for a parallel road to be built between these two points, serving the seven county roads which will be severed when the new highway SON is finished. This would cause residents in the west end to drive to the Bombing Range interchange to make connections to the new highway.

Cole stated that Boeing will grant easement for the necessary right of way for the county to construct a road north on the east boundary of the land it leases from the state so a connecting road can be built to the Boeing Airport interchange.

Decision was made by the court to build an addition from the West end of the Ed Kunze road north approximately half a mile, then west to the interchange.

The end of the year's business was discussed at the meeting of the Morrow county port commission last Thursday night here at the city hall. Gar Swanson, Ione, gave the treasurer's report.

Biggest discussion was on the land along the Columbia River that the U. S. Corps of Engineers is planning to acquire for federal uses.

A tentative meeting is being planned by all public agencies who have needs in Morrow county along the John Day pool.
