Many to Participate In Citywide Bazaar Here on July 10, 11

Heppner's first annual Sidewalk Bazaar, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, July 10 and 11, will be the greatest promotional event ever undertaken here, according to all indications.

A study of "highest and best use" of land along the Columbia River from Hood River county on the west to Umatilla county on the east will be started soon with the help of a \$16,000 grant from the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency, according to Rupert Kennedy, executive secretary of the Mid-Columbia Planning Council. He said the grant was announced by the finance agency Monday.

Grants are made on a two-for-one basis, which means the total valuation of the study is \$24,000, he said.

Mid-Columbia Planning Council, the organization of counties, city districts and other agencies in the areas bordering the river, had allocated \$3,000 for the study. The balance of funds needed will be made up in various ways, Kennedy indicated.

The State Department of Planning and Development has coordinated plans for participation of several agencies, including the State Marine Board, the Oregon Game Commission, Oregon Water Resources Board, and the Bureau of Municipal Research at the University of Oregon, the executive secretary said.

Expected to start in the near future, the study will be aimed at the gathering of information of value as a pattern for land use in the following categories:

1. Industrial sites. 2. Recreation, parks, small boating, marina sites. 3. Game habitat sites. 4. Historical, geological and archeological sites. 5. Transportation potentials and facilities. 6. Agricultural irrigation potentials. 7. Commercial and residential development.

The council applied for the grant earlier this year. When the study is completed, a report will be issued containing recommendation on the various "best" uses to which the area can be put.

The council has taken the position that such a report would provide a plan that could be followed, if desired, in achieving orderly, appropriate development of the riverfront. But the findings of the study would be limited only to the ways in which the land actually will be used are dependent on desires of the people in the areas affected.

MCGG Year Good, Grain Sales High, Auditors Report

Marketing year closing May 31 was highly successful from a volume and earnings standpoint for Morrow County Grain Growers, Inc., according to a report submitted by their auditors.

Sales of grain for the year were \$5,470,096.40, considered very good for a county of this size, while storage and handling income came to \$337,534.29. After cost of grain purchased and all other expenses, the net earnings for the year were about four cents per bushel or \$131,328.71.

Approximately \$33,000 of these profits will be distributed to the patrons in cash around November 1. Remainder will be retained for a time as usual by the cooperative as a part of its revolving capital policy.

More than 2,150,000 bushels of wheat and about 1,000,000 bushels of barley were handled for its patrons by the association from the 1963 harvest. Prices generally increased during the year with the low point being at harvest and the high point in February. The cooperative enters the 1964 harvest with no grain carry-over for the first time in 12 years. Al Lamb, manager, predicts a fairly good crop this year with stable prices.

Forestry District Holds Fire School; Ready for Season

Annual fire school of the Heppner Ranger district was held last week at Tupper Guard station with 21 taking the instruction as students. Loren Lucore, new fire control officer for the district, said.

Permanent personnel of the district acted as instructors, and this was the first time that the school was held only for employees within the district. Previously, other districts have joined for the school, but this year the Forest Service schools were set up on a district basis.

The school emphasized instruction for new employees and fire fighters. Three main phases were considered: 1. General duties, including fire prevention, maintenance of stations, 2. Smoke chasing—how to find fires, detection, instruction to lookouts, 3. Fire suppression.

All stations are now manned for the summer season. Lucore said. Lookouts are as follows: Madison Butte, Terry Dolan; Wheeler Joint, Jim Lindquist; and Tamarack, Louis Larson. Dolan is from Arizona, and Lindquist is a college student from Portland. Larson is from Pullman, Wn., and is also a college student.

At the guard stations, Kit George of Heppner is at Ditch Creek, Don Cole, Heppner teacher, is at Bull Prairie, and Bill Crooks, assistant to Lucore, is at Tupper.

In all, 60 are now employed in the Heppner Ranger district. New buildings being constructed at Tupper are rapidly taking shape and will be completed in the near future.

Lucore said that the district had its third fire of the year Friday when lightning set a 3 1/2-acre blaze on lower Skookum creek. It was extinguished by a Forest Service Crew within a short time.

Barley Harvest Gets Under Way

First barley arrived at the Lexington elevator Monday to start the 1964 harvest season in Morrow county. Al Lamb, manager of Morrow County Grain Growers, said. First load was delivered by R. A. Campbell with that of C. G. (Ken) Peck following shortly after.

Other MCGG elevators will start to receive grain after the Fourth. Wheat harvest is not expected to get underway until about the 10th or 15th.

Firemen Called To Two Ranches

Firemen responded to two calls in rural areas Monday afternoon, one a grass fire and the other a house fire.

The fire chief said that when the blaze first started, Mrs. Kenny thought she could control it with a garden hose but that the water pressure wasn't high enough to supply the needed water. The phone was out so Mrs. Kenny went to call for help. Mr. and Mrs. Robinson and Douglas Drake returned to the Kenny place with Mrs. Kenny and they extinguished the fire.
