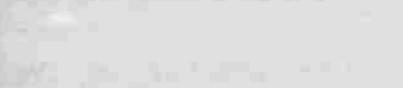
Eston Stevens of Dayville came for the week-end to visit friends and spent Saturday night with his cousin, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Musgrave.

Perry Pummel and son Darrel spent the week-end camping in the mountains near Tollgate.

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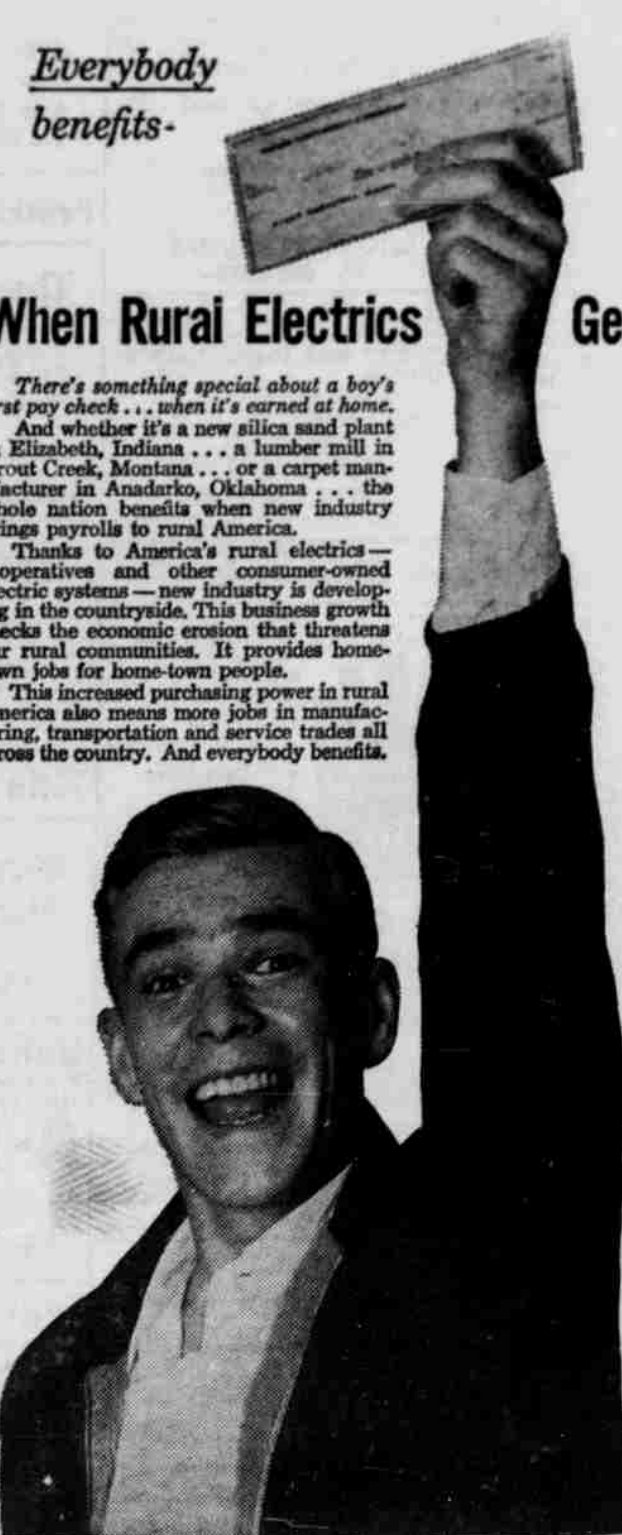
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
