New Courses Set At Blue Mountain For 1964-65 Year

Beginning with the 1964-65 academic year in September, Blue Mountain Community College will offer the full two years of lower division collegiate courses, Walter H. Palmberg, director of admissions, states.

New courses added to those already offered include essentials of mathematics, general zoology, principles of economics, history of the United States, American government, general sociology, survey of English literature, Shakespeare, first year and second year German, first year and second year French, principles of accounting, band orchestra, chorus and art appreciation.

In addition, the community college committee under higher education has authorized Blue Mountain college to offer the first two years of pre-professional instruction in business administration, pre-engineering, and engineering.

Additional offerings in the fields of technical, vocational and business education include medical-dental secretary technology. This has been in response to a constant unfilled demand for secretaries in specialized fields such as engineering, law and medicine.

The student's program in medical-dental secretary technology will vary somewhat with the amount of previous experience in typing and shorthand as well as with individual objectives. This is a two-year program designed for secretarial majors desiring specialized training to qualify them for secretarial positions in doctors' offices, clinics, hospitals, and the medical departments of large corporations. The two-year curriculum includes standard college transfer courses in the arts and sciences as well as professional subjects. Engineering secretarial training will involve the same pattern as it will apply to the engineering fields.
