# Lutherans Seek Teacher Corps For Bethel Series

The Rev. Kenneth Robinson, pastor of Hope and Valby Lutheran churches, has returned from an orientation session conducted June 28 to July 10 at Madison, Wis., by the Adult Christian Education Foundation. More than 100 pastors from across the nation met for this second of three summer clinics using the facilities of Lowell Hall on the University of Wisconsin campus.

Hope and Valby churches will now launch their use locally of the Bethel Series, a Bible study program being used by nearly 800 Christian churches.

Pastor Robinson will begin immediately to enlist a corps of prospective lay teachers, committed to a two-year teacher training program. By the fall of 1966, teacher trainees of the two churches will join some 12,000 teachers throughout the country in teaching the Bethel Series of classes of 30 adults each in their respective congregations, he said.

Using dramatic paintings and teacher disciplines, the series aims to acquaint adults with Biblical themes.

Designed and written by the Rev. Harley A. Swiggum of Bethel Lutheran church, Madison, Wis., the series accents and symbolizes basic Christian concepts of the Bible in a systematic study from Genesis to Revelation, the Rev. Robinson states. The paintings used in the series were done by Walter Ohlson of Spread Eagle, Wisc.

Mrs. Clark, whose arthritis condition was aggravated by a fall at the time of spring vacation, went to Wheeler for treatment at the clinic there when school was out. The family is hoping that she will show improvement following the treatment.
