Irrigon Council Studies Proposed City Zoning

IRRIGON—The Irrigon City Council met Tuesday evening with Mayor Chester Wilson presiding. During the evening, the council voted to retain the services of Joe Kozlovski, planning consultant of Lake Oswego for another year.

Kozlovski, who recently completed a planning survey for the city, will now go into the zoning phase. City maps prepared by the Kozlovski firm, showing proposed planning, are on display in the schoolroom where the council meets.

Mrs. Leon Bentley, secretary of the Planning Commission, asked for council approval to extend an invitation to the Irrigon Grange, Lions Club, PTA, Ladies Home Extension and any other organization to send a representative to each Planning Commission meeting, to voice opinions and suggestions and to stay informed of the Planning Commission's activities. The council gave unanimous approval to the suggestion.

In other business, it was announced that the Irrigon Chamber of Commerce had contributed \$63.90 toward the expense of conducting an election in connection with the formation of a Park District for the City of Irrigon.

School Employees Need Certificates

Employees of the Morrow county schools are reminded that Oregon School Law requires a school health certificate to be registered with the county school office prior to the opening of school on August 31.

The requirements for a health certificate include either a current negative chest X-ray report or a current negative tuberculin skin test report. Intradermal tuberculin skin tests must be obtained from a private physician. Tuberculin "Patch" tests are not acceptable under Oregon Law.

Chest X-rays can be obtained without charge at the Pioneer Memorial hospital on the first Wednesday of each month between 7:00 and 8:30 p.m., a service sponsored by the Morrow County TB and Health Association.

If chest X-rays are taken in the office of private physicians, the film must be sent to a qualified radiologist approved by the State Board of Health for interpretation.

All school health certificates must be countersigned by the county health officer through the local health department before they can be registered with the county school office.

The school health certificate cards for both chest X-ray and tuberculin skin test reports are available in the office of private physicians and at the Morrow county health department office in Heppner.
