

## Council Awards Well Bid During July 2 Meet

**BOARDMAN**—R. J. Strasser of Portland presented the lowest bid for the new city well, it being \$25,542. The only other bid was for \$29,080 by Charles Jungman Drilling Co. of Walla Walla, Wn.

The city council met last week and made recommendation to the U. S. Corps of Engineers for awarding the contract to Strasser. The bids were opened July 2.

Mayor Dewey West said the council has hopes of negotiating the contract within the next week. After the contract is executed construction is to be completed within 120 days.

The well is to be approximately 500 feet deep, with a maximum diameter at the top of 20 inches and a minimum of 10 inches at the bottom.

The intention is to have a well that will produce 410 gallons a minute.

In other action the council discussed the contract for replacing public structures and facilities in the new town, which includes the city park, boat ramp, city hall and the fire station. This contract, the second one between the city and the Corps of Engineers, is to be negotiated within the next two weeks. The replacements are to be in the new town in accordance with provision of Section III of Public Law 85-500.

Joe Tatone, chairman of the city dump committee, reported the dump facilities had been cleaned and filled, and are again ready for use.

The council passed a motion approving notary fees for Shirley Zielinski to make application for a notary seal.

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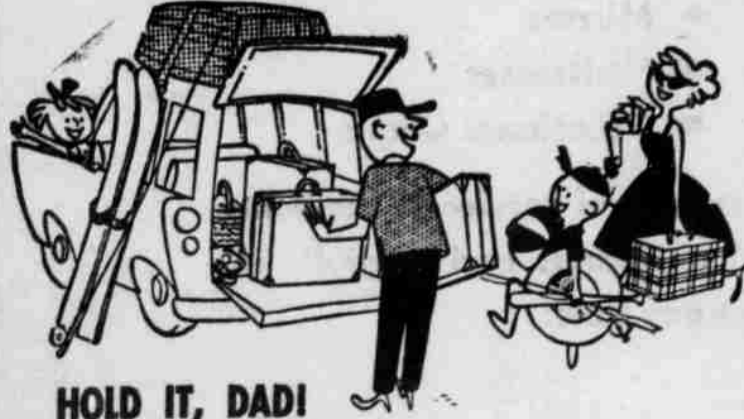
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
