# Paul Balsiger, Pioneer, Princess Martha To Be Honored Continued from page 1

Paul George Balsiger, 90, was a pioneer to the Little Butter Creek area, taking up a home-stead there in 1885, died in a hospital in The Dailes Monday. July 20.

Funeral services were at Spencer and Libby Funeral Home with interment at Idle-

wild cemetery, Hood River.

He was born in Highland, Ill.,
December 12, 1873, spending his
boyhood there and attending
Highland public schools. As a young man he served apprenticeship as a wagon maker and came to Eastern Oregon in 1895 take up the homestead.

Mr. Balsiger started a wagon business in lone. Water was the vital requirement for the thousands of horses and mules used to work the dry hills in those early days for the growing and harvesting of wheat, and he hand-sawed and planed the lumber to construct more than 400 long tank water wagons in his small shop.

In 1902 he married his childhood sweetheart, Lydia Mange, of Highland and brought her west to the home he had built

As windmills on the hills sup-planted the water wagons, he changed his business to installation and repair of the wind-mills. Later as tractors, automobiles His strong voice contributed to and machinery replaced mules the choirs of the churches he and the early ways of wheat farming, Mr. Balsiger became the largest independent farm machinery implement dealer in the area.

For many years he served in civic official capacities in Ione and was also a musician of note.
