

Legion Post Receives Awards at State Meet

Heppner Post No. 87, American Legion, won several awards for membership at the 46th annual State American Legion convention at Milwaukee July 23, 24 and 25, with four delegates attending. Representing the post and auxiliary at the sessions were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hamlin and Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Wilson.

The post received the awards for exceeding its membership quota, bringing total membership from 75 to 117. A personal citation was given to the membership chairman, Bill Blake, and to last year's commander, Don Munkers.

Mrs. Sib Wells was recognized for her poppy window, Mrs. Hamlin for the poppy corsage and Mrs. Riley Munkers as historian.

Several important resolutions were passed, including that recommending a pension for all veterans at the age of 65. Another favored elimination of inheritance taxes for widows of

veterans when they are paid their insurance policies.

Attending were some 3000 Legionnaires and their families from across the state. During the 3-day event they elected officers and selected delegates and alternates to the national convention to be at Dallas, Tex., September 18-24.

In elections of the two organizations, C. Ray Wilson, Portland, was elected department commander for the coming year; Mrs. E. A. Funk, Athena, department president of the auxiliary; Mrs. Frank Beyberg, Pendleton was installed as District 6 auxiliary president, and Mrs. Hamlin, Heppner, as vice-president. Mrs. Hamlin served on convention music and resolutions committees and Mrs. Wilson served on the poppy committee.

Hamlin was appointed Child Welfare Chairman for District 6. National Vice Commander Earl Franklin, Sterling, Colo., gave the main address at the joint session on Thursday.

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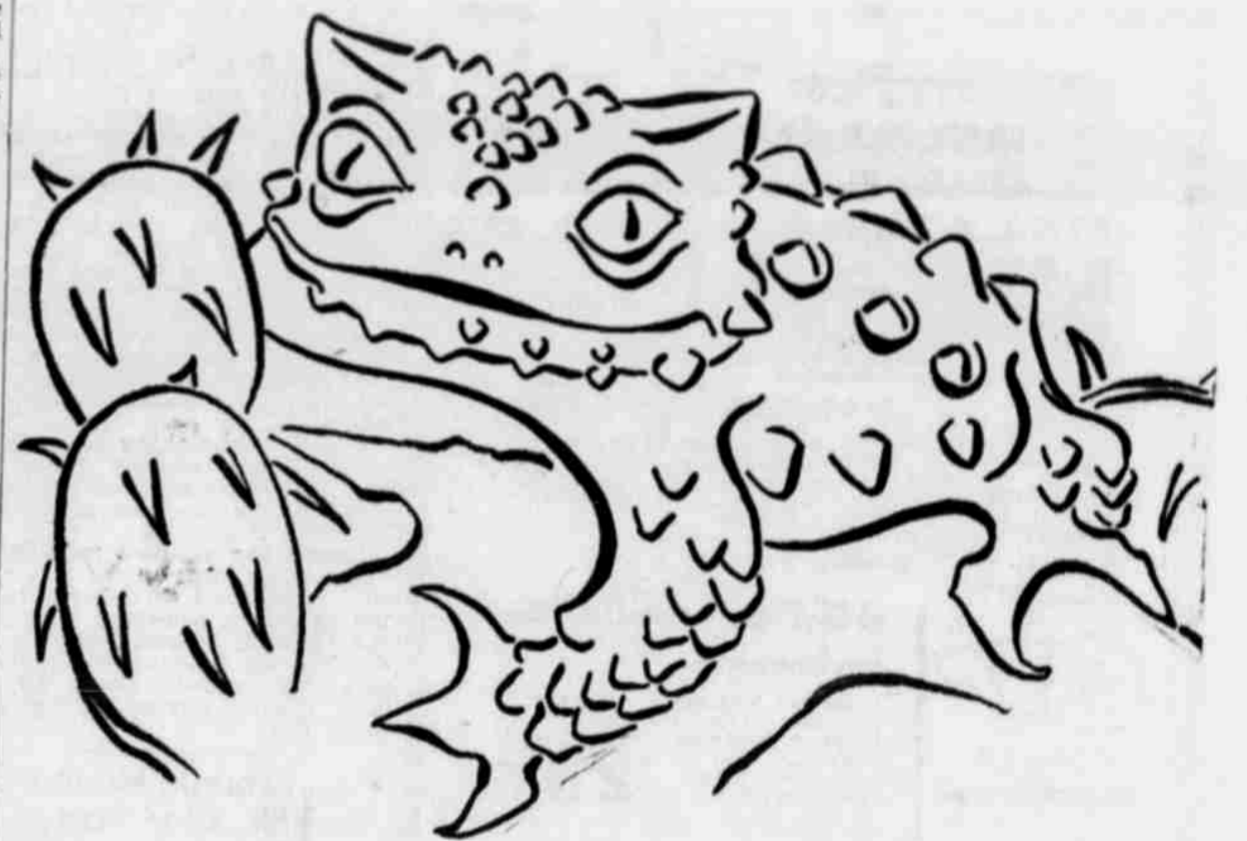
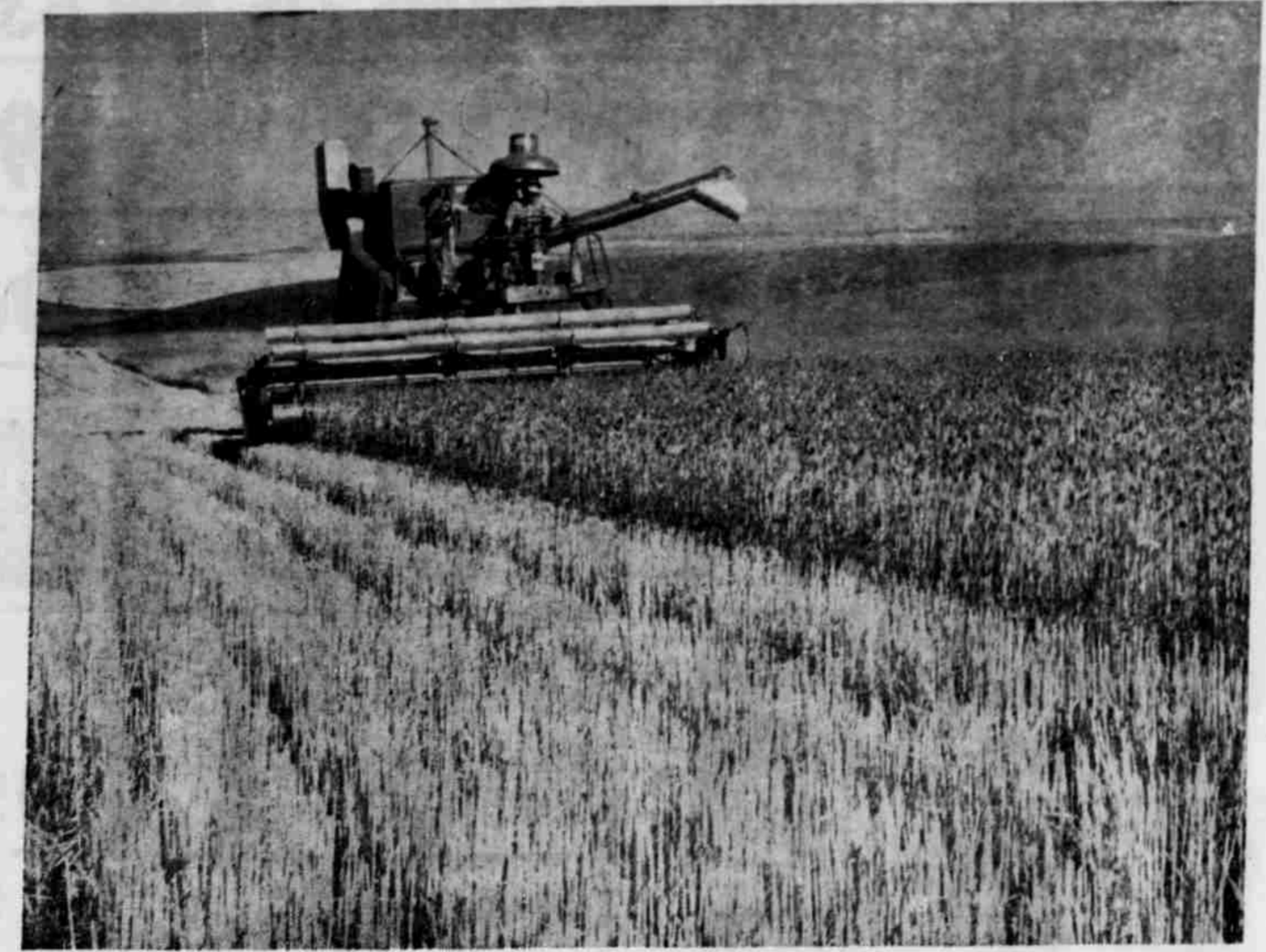

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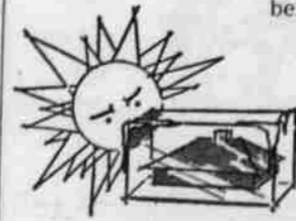
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
