

## Council Agrees To Channel Plan For Dam Project

 cess the Federal government accepts responsibility for paying for the channel rights-of-way, a very small part of the total project cost and does not know why they seek the local action here. He said that he would seek specific clarification on this point.

The engineer said that the planning phases of the Willow Creek dam project would cost an estimated \$1 million, including detailed planning prior to construction and actual plans and specifications for the dam and its structures. Already \$70,000 to \$80,000 has been spent on the Willow Creek report.

Before the project is actually under construction, details of every foot of the channel through town will be worked out, he said.

Bowman pointed out that the channel improvements would mean a great deal to residents who have property along the creek. "Those closest to the creek will be those with the most to gain," he said, indicating that the improvements will add flood protection to their properties.

In some locations, retaining walls would be constructed. Rock abutments and bars in the creek would be removed.

The channel would have capacity enough to operate for flood conditions at 1500 cu. ft. per second and a slot in the dam spillway would have a similar capacity.

Councilman Clarence Rosewall and Engineers Wayne Christensen and Ted Carr of Walla Walla were also present.

## Lack of Sewers Stalls Permits

Action on three building permits for new residences, requested by Floyd Hutchens and Ivan McDaniels, was postponed by the Heppner city council at the regular meeting Monday night until the applicants present plans for serving the proposed houses with sewers and water lines.

Hutchens applied for permits to build three houses on Skyline Drive, located below the cemetery, each at a cost of \$7000, and McDaniels applied for a permit to build one house, also at a cost of \$7000.

In discussing the applications, councilmen agreed that under terms of a city ordinance, adequate sewer and water service must be provided. Locations of the proposed structures are not now reached by a dedicated street and the sewer in the area is so situated that it cannot serve the houses without provision for pumping, councilmen said. The matter was referred back to the owners to provide plans for the service.

The council approved Frank Jamlin's application for a beer license for which he applied after purchase of Aikens Sport Shop. The application must now go to the state for action.

Chief of Police Dean Gilman reported to the council that John Mollahan has completed a 3-months trial period as a city officer and recommended that he be put on permanent status with an agreed increase in salary of \$25 per month.

LeRoy Gradner of the police committee added his recommendation, saying that Mollahan is "doing a real good job."

Councilman Clarence Rosewall reported that a member of the engineering firm of Cornell Howland, Hayes and Merryfield will be in Heppner soon, at which time he will be consulted concerning the city's proposed zoning ordinance.

If appointed by the governor, Cook would serve until the expiration of Crosswick's term at the end of this calendar year. The Rev. Earl Seward and Wm. J. (Jim) Devine are candidates for the office and one will be elected in November.

Cook previously served in the office temporarily during the final illness of J. O. Hager, former justice of the peace for many years.

At its meeting Wednesday the county court also appointed Marion Green to the county planning commission, succeeding Paul Brown who has resigned.

The court also considered appointment of a new juvenile counselor to succeed the Rev. Charles Knox who has resigned, but took the matter under advisement.

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 attract a total of 4000 skiers for the season.

"The benefits will rub off in many places," Peck said, pointing out that the increased traffic here would help stimulate local business.

"We are going to start selling stock as soon as possible," Peck said. It is planned that it will be available at \$10 per share.

Bob Henry, another of those keenly interested in the project, said, "Everyone who would go through town would leave \$5 on the average. I would estimate that this would amount to \$10,000 or \$15,000 per season." He urged that businessmen be concerned and actively support the venture.

L. E. Dick added the statement that construction of the facilities would also hold families who are now "ski bugs" at home instead of going to other winter playgrounds on week-ends.

At the present time only three acres are cleared on the ski area. Peck presented a written statement at the time of his presentation it states, in part:

"Morrow county has a growing new recreation development. This is the Arbuckle Mountain Corporation, licensed to do business in the State of Oregon. The 290-acre site is on National Forest land in the Heppner Ranger district. Negotiations are now underway between the corporation, ski club and the Forest Service for the use permit.

"Initial incorporators are Clarence Rosewall, Herman Winter, Ed Dick, Oliver Creswick, Wes Sherman and Ken Peck. Since its inception in June, the corporation has been making plans for more complete development of the Arbuckle Mountain Ski area. These plans call for a cable lift to the mountain top, a distance of 2000 feet from about the location of the present warming hut. A ski trail down will be cleared 100 feet wide through existing clearings to make a run of about a half mile.

"Improved toilets and a water system from Chicken Springs are also planned. The beginner area is to be graded and enlarged and will have a 300 ft. rope tow. To date, a lift-line profile survey, a site plan survey for the base area, and a 25 ft. contour survey for the 290-acre area have been made.

"In order to finance this work the corporation proposes to sell \$10,000 of stock in this community. Shares are \$10 no-par common stock.

"The advantages of having a recreation development such as this are generally known. It will draw people to the area and give the youth an outlet on which to expend their energies.

"People will come to the area to ski if the lifts are good; the runs are fun to ski on, and the roads are no problem to travel over," the statement concluded. Preliminary estimates worked out show that the ski area could show a substantial profit if costs are held within estimates and if the area is developed good enough to attract a reasonable number of skiers, Peck said.

Directors of the new corporation met Tuesday night to plan for its stock sale, further negotiations for the use permit, and other details. It has been hoped that the work could be done at the area in time for the 1964-65 season, but this will depend on how fast the corporation is able to progress.
