Shrine Grid Game In Portland Set At 1:30 Saturday

A wide open contest is predicted for the 17th annual Shrine's hospital all-star football game in Multnomah stadium, Portland, Saturday, August 8. Kick-off is scheduled for 1:30 p.m., to be preceded by 30 minutes of pageantry.

This will mark the first time the tilt—often referred to as "football's finest hour"—has been played in the afternoon, and game officials are hoping the switch from a night to a day contest will lure a record number of spectators from outside the Portland area.

The State and Metro 27-man squads, representing the cream of last year's high school seniors, will have had two weeks of intensive practice by game time.

State is coached by E. L. (Spike) Hillstrom of North Salem, assisted by Don Sequa of Pendleton and Al Simpson of Cottage Grove. Metro reins are in the hands of Frank Buckiewicz of Portland's Grant High. His aids are Will Herrington of Parkrose and Duke Moore of Beaverton.

The series between the two teams is even at 7 wins and 2 ties each.

The Staters are expected to pin their hopes for victory on the strong throwing arm of Pendleton's Dick Jones, the All American prep quarterback. Metro coaches make no bones about the fact that Jones will bear constant watching, and they have drilled their charges thoroughly on ways and means of corraling the Pendleton bomber.

Alan Hubka of Beaverton is expected to provide the aerial fireworks for the Metros, operating from quarterback.

Both teams boast many fine running backs and strong lines, and sideline observers, including many college coaches, have been hesitant to establish a favorite.

"It should be one of the best Shrine games in many years," one college coach said after watching the squads in practice sessions. "I've never seen so many outstanding players for a long, long time."

Reserved seats at \$3 and \$2 as well as general admission seats at \$1 will be sold at the stadium the day of the game, starting at 10 a. m.

Valentine Enters Innocent Pleas

Jim Valentine, now of The Dalles, entered pleas of innocent last Thursday to three charges brought against him by secret indictment of the Morrow County grand jury.

Appearing in Morrow County circuit court of Judge William Wells, Valentine pleaded innocent to two charges of obtaining money under false pretenses and one of larceny by embezzlement. Complaints were signed by Jack Glavey, Mervin Leonard and Lloyd Hudspeth.

Judge Wells set trial date for September 10 on one of the charges of obtaining money under false pretenses. He reduced bail from \$27,000 to \$10,000, but in lieu of posting bail, Valentine was being held in the Wasco county jail, The Dalles.

Valentine was represented by Burda and Somers, attorneys, The Dalles, and District Attorney Herman Winter is handling the prosecution.

Valentine has filed a civil action in circuit court against Van Hubbard of Ione, seeking \$423.48 for alleged damages done to his truck by the defendant, together with \$400 attorney's fees.

Judge Wells heard guilty pleas of Burton H. Peck of Boardman on two charges of receiving stolen property and sentenced him to two three months terms in jail to run consecutively. Peck was taken to the Rocky Butte jail in Portland. Bob Abrams represented him as defense counsel and District Attorney Winter represented the state.
