## Revolving Trophy Given For Horse Show Winner

Fred Mankin, superintendent of the Morrow county horse show, reminds everyone to keep August 28 in view—the date of the show this year.

For the first time the champion performance horse will receive a revolving trophy, being donated by Jerry Dagggett, Shell Oil distributor here.

The trophy will be won by the horse receiving the most points in the performance division in lots 5, 6, 8, 9 and 11. To gain permanent possession a horse must win the trophy three years in a row. Points used will be figured on five points for first place, four points for second, three points for third and two points for fourth. In case of a tie, both names will be placed on the trophy and each horse will have possession for six months.

Mankin has expressed great pleasure with the cooperation given by Heppner businessmen. Many fine awards await winners in all events.

Red Tubbs has started work at Long Creek mill.

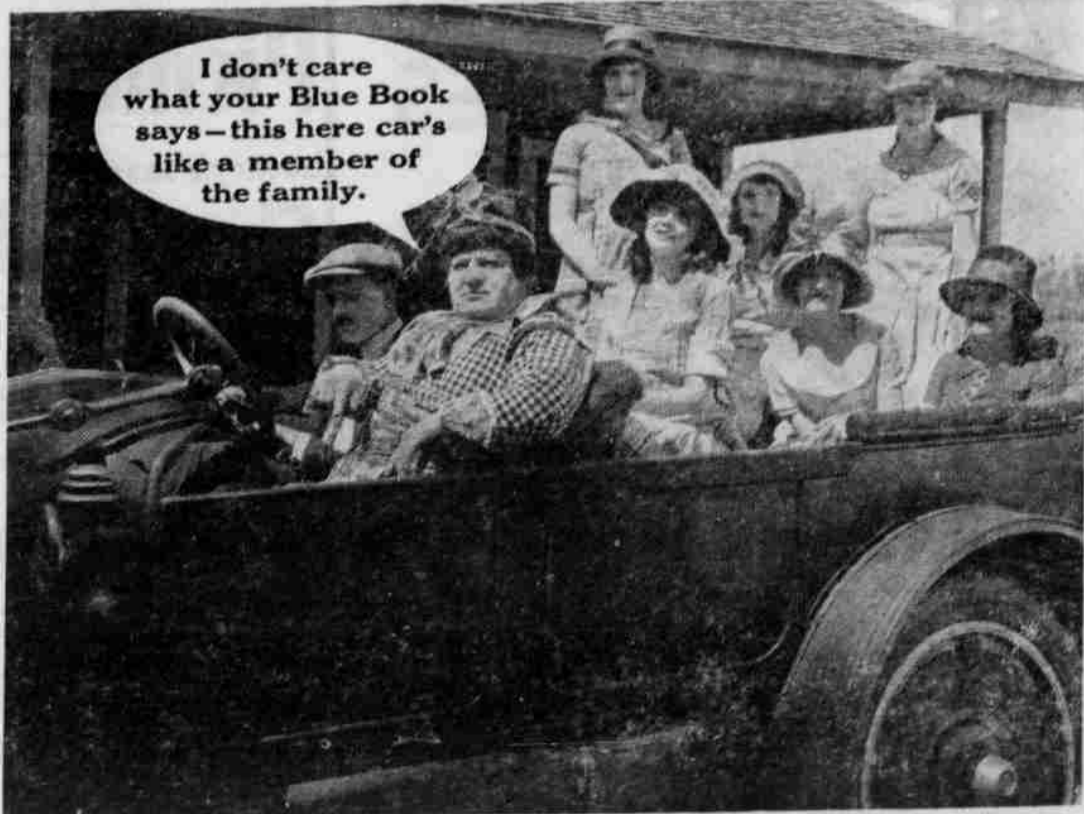
