Among bids to be received by the State Highway Commission on August 25 in Salem will be those for construction of a new 340-foot structure over Willow Creek on Interstate 80N (Columbia River Highway) at Heppner Junction. This is located in Gil- liam county. The structure will have two lanes to carry eastbound traffic on the freeway and will be located about 11 miles east of Arling- ton. Completion date is set for the summer of 1965.

Spring wheat is looking fair in higher elevations. Fall grain harvest finished in lower areas; in full swing in higher elevations. Yields spotted, depend- ing on precipitation pattern. Wheat yields will be one-third above late May predictions. County average 24 bushels of high quality, high test weight grain. Second and third hay crops being put up. Some rain damage last week. Watermel- ons being harvested in Board- man-Irrigon area; need hot weather for faster maturity. Cantaloupes to come next week.
