

School Opening Planned; Teachers Prepare Schedule

BOARDMAN—Ronald Daniels, principal of Riverside High school and Boardman Grade school, announces the following schedules for the opening of the school year. School starts the morning of August 31 at 8:45. Buses will follow the same schedule as last year. Buses will leave the building at 10 a. m., August 28 to bring both grade and high school students in for registration at 10:45. They will return home at 11:30 a. m.

All teachers will go to Pendleton August 26 for a service training meeting with the Pendleton faculty from 9 to 12 a. m. Grades 1-4 will meet at the Hawthorne school, and the high school at the high school.

Te grades will have a workshop on new mathematics, and the high school review a program on team teaching. At 1 p. m. they will have luncheon at the Tapadera Motel restaurant. Following lunch Dr. Frank Bennett, retired president of Eastern Oregon College, will address the group.

Other speakers include a welcome address by Howard Cleveland, school board chairman; David Potter, school superintendent, on the school year ahead; Gordon Pratt, Heppner High principal on Morrow County O. E. A.; Bruce Burns, Umatilla-Morrow County Credit Union. Beverly Gunderson, school clerk, will instruct the teachers on office needs.

August 27 grade school teachers may or may not go back to Pendleton for mathematics. At 1:30 p. m. there will be a faculty meeting for both grade and high school teachers in Boardman for work time. The afternoon of August 28 will also be work time.

Boardman has only one teacher this year, Mrs. Elaine LaCombe, who will teach the third grade. A graduate of Northwest Nazarene school at Nampa, Idaho, Mrs. LaCombe taught at Carson City, Nev., last year.
