

1964 Morrow Fair To Open Tuesday; New Marks Eyed

(Continued from page 1) Exhibits and facilities for open class exhibits that will begin to come in that day, Ron Davis, Olex, will be the judge for 4-H horsemanship and showmanship classes that will get underway at 9:00 a.m. at the rodeo area. With 4-H entries closing at 11:00 a.m., there will be a variety of contests during the afternoon.

At 1:00 p.m. 4-H clothing and foods judging contests will run simultaneously with the 4-H and FFA livestock judging contests. During the afternoon flower and vegetable entries will be received and 4-H home economics exhibits will be judged. On Wednesday, 4-H home economics judging will continue, and judging will get underway in the morning on varied open class home economics exhibits as well as 4-H livestock.

Thursday, August 27, will see the highly competitive 4-H livestock showmanship contests in the morning while 4-H home economics demonstrations are being held.

Pet Parade Billed
Mrs. Bernard Doherty urges all boys and girls (5 through 14 years) to enter their pets in the pet show which will be held from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. with the parade of pets beginning at 11:30 a.m. in the judging arena. This has been a popular attraction in the past. Open class livestock will be judged during the afternoon, as will 4-H demonstration contests.

The ever popular pig scramble will be held as a lively "starter" for the 4-H and FFA livestock auction. Entries made to date for the sale are 13 market hogs, 30 market lambs and 9 market steers. Ron Currin, chairman of the livestock auction, reminds everyone that this is an opportunity for them to secure some choice meat for their lockers.

Four-H, FFA and open class exhibitors will be vying for many special awards again this year. In addition to the open class premier beef exhibitor trophy provided by the Morrow County Livestock Growers association and the sweepstakes wheat exhibit trophy by Morrow County Grain Growers, a new trophy was added this year for champion performance horse, provided by Jerry Daggett, Shell distributor.

Cake Contest Slated
Participants in the Oregon Wheat Growers League cake baking contest will compete for eligibility for the state bake-off, in addition to premiums at the annual convention of the Oregon Wheat Growers League at La Grande later this year.

A long list of awards is being made available to 4-H home economics exhibitors with the Rhea Creek, Lone, Heppner, Boardman, Irrigon and Pine City extension units offering prizes for the best demonstrations in foods, clothing, and knitting. The Morrow County Cowbellees will provide special awards for demonstrations using meat, while the Oregon Bee Keepers association will provide special awards for demonstrations using honey. The General Foods Corp. and Oregon Egg council also provide special awards, as will the Oregon Turkey Improvement Association, Oregon Wheat Commission, Safeway Stores, Oregon Wool Growers, Oregon Fryer Commission, and Spreckles Sugar Company in food contests.

Trophies will be provided to junior and senior livestock judging contest winners by Ford's Tire Service and Wes' Highfield Station. Lexington Oil Co.-op, Morrow County Grain Growers and Jordan Elevator continue their livestock showmanship contests awards to junior, intermediate and senior showmen in all classes of livestock. The grand champion showmanship award will be continued by N. C. Anderson for the 17th consecutive year.

The American Guernsey Cattle club, Ekstrom Farm Chemicals, Herbert Ekstrom and Sons, the Harold Wright family, Kirk and Robinson Association, Oregon Pollettes and the American Polled Hereford association will provide awards for various 4-H and FFA livestock exhibitors with emphasis on the breeds which they are partial to.

Four-H saddle horse club members will again compete for showmanship awards in the small fry, junior, intermediate and senior classes for trophies presented for many years by Central Market and Turner, Van Marter and Bryant.

Improvements Made
Fairgoers will find new restroom facilities on the grounds this year and a newly constructed building which also will provide dormitory space for boys and girls who find it inconvenient to be on the grounds early in the morning to care for livestock or to participate in home economics activities. Finishing touches on the new building are being made, racing with the fair opening dates. Exhibitors will also find new modern office facilities which will enable clerks and superintendents to better serve them.

Everyone will be well fed by concessions operated on the grounds. Four-H leaders and parents will operate the 4-H Snack Shack Monday through Friday with the ladies of Rhea Creek Grange planning an evening dinner on the day of the 4-H and FFA livestock auction. With new facilities, enthusiasm and lots of exhibits, 1964 could be the "biggest fair yet."

Rodeo Committees Prepare Big Show For August 29-30

(Continued from page 1) for the first time this year is offering a \$35 belt buckle for first in bull riding. Herman Green will give a trophy buckle for the winner of the Wranglers club cow riding and Howard Keithley, Heppner, will present a silver buckle to the Chamber of Commerce cow riding. John Eubanks said Thursday that three more awards are coming from Arlington for 2nd and 3rd and 4th in the Northwest Amateur Bronco riding, a pair of chaps, spurs and buck rein.

Jack Locke, rodeo secretary, has been charged with the responsibility of finding entrants for the Chamber of Commerce cow riding, and at last report hadn't had much luck in finding volunteers. Closing of entries for the rodeo will be earlier this year than ever before in order to allow more time for drawings, printing of programs and detail work. Entries will close at 8 p.m. Thursday, August 27, and entry fees are to be paid by that time. Chairman Jones and Locke will be in the new rodeo office under the buckaroo stand next Thursday evening to take entries.

Drawing for stock will be conducted later in the night. John Van Belle of Outlook, Wn., again will furnish stock for the rodeo. Chairman Jones states that it is planned to hold this year's afternoon shows to 2 hours and 45 minutes each. The Saturday show will start promptly at 1:15 and the Sunday show will be at 1:30 sharp. In addition, the Saturday night show will start at 8 p.m. Admission prices are listed in an advertisement on page 1, section 2. Randall Peterson of the Chamber of Commerce said that plans are being made for the Pendleton Drum and Bugle Corps to appear prior to the opening of the Saturday afternoon show.

Bill Jones of Vancouver will be rodeo announcer again this year, and the reliable Rose City Sound Co. will be back to handle the sound system. A clown, Eric Muehleisen of Enumclaw, Wn., has been engaged for the shows. A clown is considered a "must" for the bull riders, since he has the job of distracting the maddened bulls to prevent serious injury to a cowboy who has been thrown. Elmer Schmidt of the Chamber of Commerce will have charge of ticket sales and during the coming week will get his crew in hand for the job.
