Graveside services were held today (Thursday) for Leo Conner Perry of Ellensburg, Wn., at the Heppner Masonic cemetery at 2:00 p.m. He was a brother to Mrs. Mae Gilliam, Heppner.

Mr. Perry died Sunday, August 16, at the naval hospital in Bremerton. He had recently retired from a 30-year career in the navy, and held a chief musician's mate rating.

Officiating at the service was Father Jackson E. Gilliam, Church of the Incarnation, Great Falls, Montana, an uncle of the deceased. Military rites were held by the Heppner post of the American Legion.

Perry was born February 1, 1907, at Lone Rock, Oregon. He was a veteran of World War II. His father and mother, two brothers and a sister preceded him in death.

He is survived by his wife, Jeanne, of Ellensburg; two sisters, Mrs. Gilliam, Heppner, and Mrs. Linnie Clapp, Pendleton; one brother, Lawrence Perry of Ellensburg.
