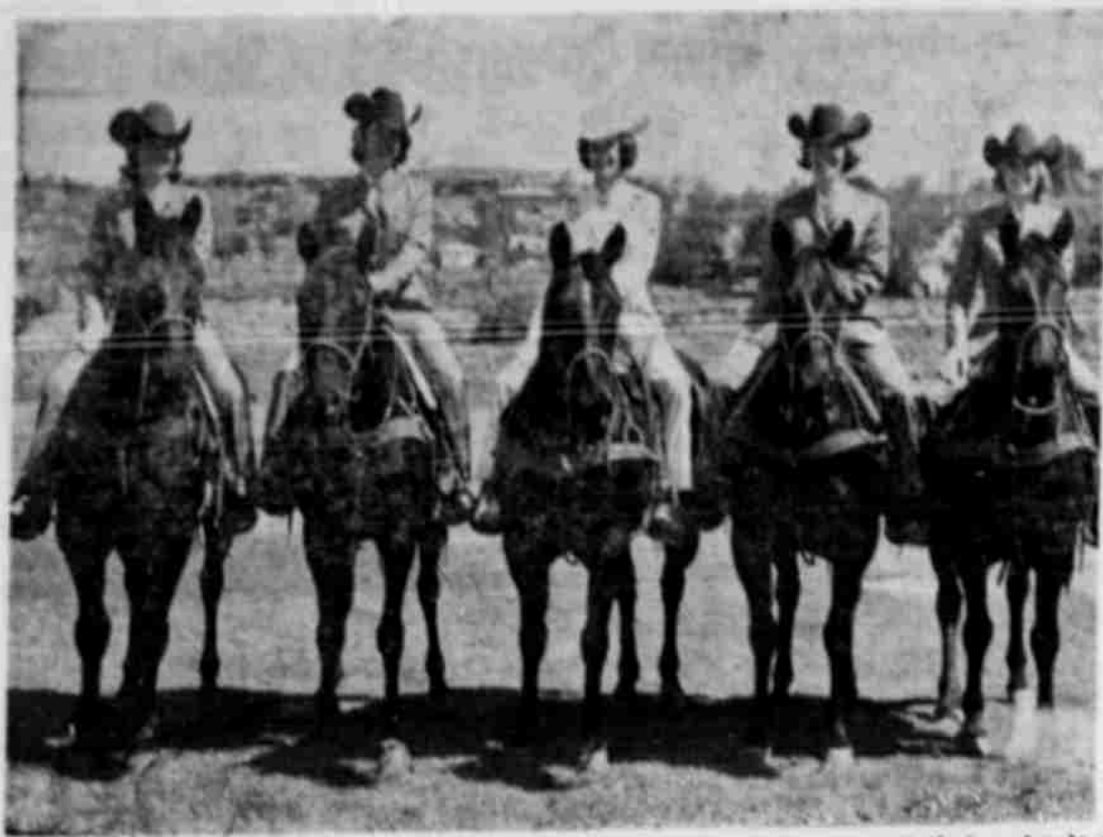

ADC Certificate Given Newspaper For 'Scope' Work

Mr. and Mrs. Wes Sherman, publishers of the Gazette-Times, were presented a Certificate of Achievement recently from the Air Defense Command signed by Commander Hubert Thatcher in connection with their work of publication of "The Scope," newspaper of the 636th Radar Squadron, Condon Air Station.

Presentation was made to Sherman in Heppner by Lt. Joseph P. Bigelow, public relations officer of the Condon radar station. Major Richard Solomon is commanding officer of the station.

"The Scope" recently won first place in the nation for newspapers of air stations in class I, competing against some 100 papers in the class.

The framed certificate reads: "United States Air Force, Air Defense Command, Certificate of Achievement is presented to Wesley A. Sherman in recognition of outstanding performance as publisher of The Scope, first place winner, class I Commercial Enterprise Newspaper, in the 1963 ADC Newspaper Contest."

The paper is published under a cooperative arrangement with the Condon air station. While men of the air station do the

writing, copy preparation and other duties necessary in publication, they are not permitted by regulations to assume financial obligations or responsibility for the paper.

Lt. Tom Goldie, who late last year was transferred to Alaska, and Sgt. Jim Chauncey, now in Texas prior to reassignment, did editorial work on the paper during the period that issues were judged in the contest.

Much of the credit for the award to the Gazette-Times is due to Arnold Raymond, shop foreman, who has been in charge of mechanical work in publication of the paper.

Presently doing the editorial work of the paper are Lt. Bigelow and George Cooper of the Condon station.

The Gazette-Times publishes "The Scope" under contract with the Air Defense Command.

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
