second go-round was Bob Steagall, just a whisker behind Heilberg at 25.3, and third was Pat O'Brien in a time of 27.9.

Heilberg and Steagall were the only entrants to successfully rope their calves in both go-rounds, and Heilberg's total time of 68.5 was better than Steagall's 76.0. The second place finisher received a certificate for a pair of handmade western boots from Del Brown, Pendleton. Pat O'Brien received third and gets a gift certificate from Gardner's Men's Wear as a prize.

Heilberg and Tad Miller shared honors for the new Orville Cutsforth trophy for Mor-St. Paul Cowboy continued.

They tied in points scored. The two split the prize money, and Heilberg told Miller to take the trophy for the year since he had received the saddle for the calf roping. Each will get credit for a leg on the trophy which requires winning three consecutive years for permanent possession.

In one special event, that of merchants' calf tying or roping, as it was billed on the program—it could be said that the calves won. The husky animals gave the businessmen quite a beating. However, Lyle Jensen succeeded in tying his calf and came out top money winner. Second was Jerry Schubert and third was Harley Sager. Jensen captured the trophy buckle offered by Howard Keithley.

Girls' barrel racing proved an exciting event with both Williams of Idaho emerging as champion and winning a \$25 gift certificate from Gilliam and Bisbee. The Idaho cowgirl posted times of 19.2, first day, and 19.4, second day. Her first day's time was third behind Ruby Fulleton, a Heppner favorite, first with 18.9, and Kay Wigle, second with 19.0.

Second on Sunday was Kay Wigle with 18.7, which gave her second in the averages, and tied for third were Donna Hamilton of Eugene and Alice Williams, also of Idaho. These two also tied for third in the averages.

Twenty-three cowgirls participated in the event and displayed excellent horsemanship. Sid Britt scored 169 and 165 in two go-rounds of bareback riding to capture this event in the averages. His first day's points topped the field, and he was second in the Sunday go-round. Second in averages was Tom Russell and third was Larry Unruh. Don Dixon of Toppenish, Wn., was fourth and Leonard Halsey of Heppner was fifth.

Second on Saturday in the bareback was Tom Russell, followed by Pat Daily, Larry Unruh's 166 points Sunday topped the cowboys for that day, followed by Britt, Russell, Dixon and Halsey.

In addition to his purse, Britt won a bareback rig from Gray's Saddlery, Heppner.

Marvin Bothum of Woodburn proved top hand in bull riding with his 174 points in a single go-round competition. Paul Sloan with 170 points was second and Dave Elford of LaCenter, Wn., with 168 was third. Tied for fourth were Bob Conforth of Har-miston and Doug points, and Joe Crowder, White Swan, Wn., cowbody, was fifth with 152. Bothum received a \$35 belt buckle from the New York Store, Pendleton.

Calf ropers found the going rough in this rodeo, and many failed to rope their animals. However Darrell Waddill scored in both go-rounds, 18.6 and 15.4, for total time of 34.0 and top money. Second was Bill Wadd with 20.3 and 21.1 for total of 41.4 seconds. In third place was Billy King with 22.6 and 20.9 for 43.5, and fourth was Bob Johnson with 29.6 and 17.5 for 47.1. Waddill was first go-round winner, followed by Everett Reed in a time of 19.7; Bill Ward, 20.3; and Ray Lovell, 20.6. Arvine Porter topped the second go-round at 15.1 after taking no time the first day. Waddill was second on Sunday, and Bob Juker and Dick Wilde tied for third, each with 17.0.

Don Anderson of Arlington copped the honors in wild cow milking, doing the difficult job in 29.2. Second was Fred Holly of Glenwood, Wn., in 33.1, third was Waddill in 46.6, and fourth was Eddie Higgins of Maupin in 46.7. Everett Reed took fifth at 55.4 and Fred Wyatt of Pilot Rock was sixth with 60.4.

Bill Neilson was winner of bulldogging with times of 7.4 and 11.3 for total of 18.7. Stan Spencer was second in the averages with 11.2 and 7.9 for 19.1. Third was Fred Holly with 10.6 and 11.8 for 22.4 and fourth was Jyme Stoner of Baker with 38.1 and 13.9 for 52.0. The four were the only ones successful in dogging their steers on both go-rounds.

Ken Clegg with 8.3 followed Neilson for day money on Saturday with Fred Holly third and Spencer fourth. On Sunday Spencer led with his 7.9 followed by Dick Krieger with 8.4, Neilson and Holly.

Champions in team roping were Porter and Juker with 11.3, and other teams finished as follows: Second, Bob Hershey and Bud Alexander, 12.1; third, Neilson and Carl Gibson, 12.6; fourth, Fred Fitzgibbon and Leo Newhardt, 13.4; fifth, Joe and Jay McAuliffe, 14.3; and sixth, Ward and King, 16.1.

Races proved to be a thrilling part of the rodeo. Winner of the Morrow county derby Sunday was Ray Papineau's entry, and this brought him a \$100 award
